## Current Thought.

### PICNICS

Picnics are quite the rage during the summer months, as they offer the city dweller an opportunity to enjoy a social gathering out in the open spaces without having to resort to a stuffy room. Picnics seem to have the approval of the older ages, which usually meet with great success both socially and financially.

Among the English-conducted lodges picnics are not as prominent as they are in the mother lodges. Affairs of this interest the younger members rather mildly, with the success of a picnic depending upon the patronage of the older members to a great extent.

Which makes one wonder why. What reason or perhaps reasons underly it? Why is it that picnics are rarely sponsored by the English-conducted lodges?

Upon investigation one can readily see a number of reasons. Chief of which is the lack of perfect unity enjoyed by older lodges. Before this editorial goes further, it wishes to emphasize the fact that the English-conducted lodges are to be blamed for such existence of circumstances for several reasons. These will be enumerated below. It is sufficient to say at this point that the English-conducted lodges have not been organized as many years as have the older lodges.

But coming back to the reasons that the older lodges can make such a grand success of a picnic, points to the fact that the spirit of fraternalism is imbued deeper in the hearts of its members, as the years go by. Their sincere co-operation and earnestness to accomplish for the welfare of their lodge should serve as a stimulant for the younger members to follow like wise. To stick together and work for a common purpose.

### English-Conducted Lodges Are Building Foundations for the Future

The English-conducted lodges today contain a number of young members, some of which are attending high school, while others attend college, and still others are occupied in their field of work. It is safe to assume that the majority of the younger members are still free from assuming any of responsibilities forced upon one by married life. In other words, they are still "single."

And as such, they naturally wish to enjoy a lot of freedom, wishing to be tied down to any particular line of responsibility. They want to take an active part in the general work maintained by our unions, but must be given time to accustom themselves.

As a young couple settles down to married life, they invariably shoulder tasks that they would have shirked from were they still "single." But now it is taken as a matter of course, and for that reason they take a more active interest in social work than they have heretofore.

It is for this reason that our young English-conducted lodges have not shown as great interest in the activities sponsored by their lodge as one would want them to. They are still in the developing stage and will show deeper interest and enthusiasm as the years go by.

In fact the number of members will increase much more rapidly in the future than it has heretofore.

### Suggest Board Of Americanization

For the benefit of the members in general of the South Slavonic Catholic Union, we should not only have an athletic board, but also a board of Americanization.

This body would continually advise the young and the old in athletics, citizenship and patriotism. The general procedure would be to publish articles both in the English and the Slovenian languages in the official organ, the New Era.

A permanent program could be outlined, which would benefit the members. With the proper co-operation this idea could be carried through with great success, making for a greater and better South Slavonic Catholic Union.

And, by the way, why not go and get that new member for your lodge? Figures improve with exercise, so why not hike over to see that prospect for the S. S. C. U.? You'll both benefit by the trip.

### S. S. C. U. CHAMPIONSHIP OF CLEVELAND, O.

#### AT STAKE

George Washington and Collinwood Boosters Indoor Teams of Cleveland, O., Engage in Inter-Lodge League Contest July 23 at White City Field

Watch the dust fly next Wednesday, July 23, when the two S.S.C.U. entries in the Inter-Lodge League battle for supremacy at White City field. Both the George Washingtons and the Collinwood Boosters have teams that need constant watching; the cherry tree battlers having the edge with five victories and one defeat to date, while the Boosters have two victories and three defeats in five starts.

The pitching of Joe Jarc for the Washingtons has been sensational this season; in last week's game against the Spartans (SSPZ) 19 strikeouts were credited him, and in the game against the Progressives (SNPJ) no less than 20 opponents were struck out. Ten and eleven strikeouts for Jarc in one game is considered nothing out of the ordinary.

**FISH HATCHERY**

By Joseph Mantel

A little fellow comes to the store and buys a 15-cent spear; then he goes out to a creek and gets enough fish for the whole family. A good many people do not know just how the fish are hatched, so let's see where they come from.

The state of Minnesota has a large hatchery located at the mouth of the Pike River near Tower, Minn., on Lake Vermillion, from which they distribute walleyed pike fry every spring to the lakes in the northeastern part of the state.

A clipping taken from the Tower News during the operations at the hatchery says:

"Reports from Pike River are to the effect that the spawn gathering operations of the State Game and Fish Department has been most successful up to this time. Last week-end, before the cold weather set in, the fish were coming up in droves, and spawn enough was taken in the first few days to fill the hatchery. The colder weather, however, slowed up the run of pike and the work of the men to some extent. The pike so far taken are much larger than ordinarily, according to Paul S. Goodell, who is in charge of the operations at the Pike River Hatchery. Tons of suckers have been caught in the nets, and these have been given to the farmers and others who wanted them."

As we are interested in fishing, we went one day to this hatchery and watched the men at their work and got all possible information from Mr. Goodell, superintendent of the hatchery. We got there in time to see them taking the fish from the nets and watched them strip the fish of their eggs.

The hatchery is about seven miles west of Tower and located on the west shore of the river about a block from Lake Vermillion. There is a very beautiful falls and rapids in the river just above the hatchery. The river at the place where the hatchery is located is about fifty feet wide. Below it widens out and empties into Pike Bay of Lake Vermillion. Lake Vermillion is quite a lake for summer homes, there being many beautiful and modern summer homes scattered along its shores.

Early in the spring, soon after the break-up of the winter's ice, the men in charge of Mr. Goodell come to the hatchery. They place their net across the river from bank to bank. It is in the shape of a "V," with the point of the V pointing upstream and against the current. At the point of this V there is an opening leading into the landing net. The fish in going upstream to spawn follow the sides of the net through this funnel opening and into the landing net.

This part of the net is raised twice a day and the fish are taken out and hooked over.

Those not yet "ripe" are placed in a large live box and left for a day or two. Those found to be ripe are stripped at once. A slight pressure on the abdomen of the fish forces the eggs from them. The milk from the male fish also is taken this way. The milk is stirred with the eggs by using the tail of the male fish as the spoon. In this manner, the eggs are not harmed nor is the fish hurt in any way. It is found that there are about four males caught in the run to one female.

**Radio vs. Phonograph**

Will the radio ever fully replace the phonograph? By that I mean, will it ever entertain the people as fully and with the wholesome reaction that the phonograph brought about.

It seems to me that advertising over the air mars the program somewhat. Of course, some stations do a minimum of advertising, while others go in the opposite extremes. Perhaps you have noticed that the programs broadcast by the larger corporations usually offer musical numbers with artists performing. Very little mention is made of the product advertised, as such programs offered are listened in by the more well-to-do class. A hint to them is considered sufficient without necessitating the repetition of the monotonous ordeal of the high quality of the product, etc.

Without advertising radio broadcasts could not be possible, as somebody has to pay for the continuance of the station. Otherwise they would cease to function.

That is the reason that radio will never prove as entertaining as the phonograph. The law of compensation applies here as it does in all cases. You receive exactly what you give, with the article merely exchanged.

When you turn on the radio you are compelled to listen to what somebody else has arranged for you, good or bad. You have the privilege of changing stations if one program does not suit you, but another may prove to be just as bad if not worse. On the other hand, you can select the record to be played on the phonograph and hear what you have selected. After the number is played your ears received a rest and are not taxed with the burden of what the announcer has to say in connection with what is advertised.

People adjust themselves to the surroundings very quickly, and maybe if the advertising was lacking in radio broadcasts people would feel that something was entirely missing. But for my part I want to hear music without having to listen how the nineteen-cylinder automobile can perform on the smooth road, etc. All in all, I prefer the phonograph. L. M. K.
