Killed in France

\$10,000 OFFERED AS PEACE TREATY CONTEST

AWARDS

New York. — An opportunity for every American to write a practical peace treaty which can be applied to the world at the end of the war was announced by Joseph W. Frazer, Chairman of the Board of the Graham-Paige Motors Corp. and Chairman of the judges' committee of the National Peace Treaty Contest.

Total prizes to be awarded for the best peace treaties of 1,000 words or less written by Americans will be \$10,000 in war bonds, Mr. Frazer said. The contest, which opened March 17 and closes at midnight, April 15, is open to all legal residents of the United States or its possessions, and to men and women serving in the armed forces wherever they may be. National headquarters are at 350 Fifth Ave., New York.

Inspiration for the contest came from the best-selling book written by William B. Ziff, "The Gentlemen Talk of Peace," Mr. Frazer said. "The aim of the National Peace Treaty Contest," he explained, "is to seek out from the minds of the millions of plain Americans, the best practical plans and ideas for a just and durable peace, so that when our delegates sit around the peace table, they will know what the people want."

Vice President Harry S. Truman, who is a member of the contest judges' committee, declared in a statement made in connection with the contest: "I hope that the National Peace Treaty Contest will be of great assistance in realizing our hope that the coming peace will be a permanent guarantee of no more wars. Nothing should be left undone to achieve this goal."

Other members of the committee of judges besides Frazer, Truman and Ziff, are: Senator Owen Brewster, Republican of Maine; Ray Rand, former army private who was wounded at Salerno; Fannie Hurst, author and novelist; Mrs. Warren R. Cain, Los Angeles Catholic clubwoman and blue star mother; Dr. Rockwell D. Hunt, dean of the Graduate School, University of Southern California; Rev. Ralph W. Sockman, minister of Christ Church, Methodist, New York City; Wm. Green, president of the American Federation of Labor; and Clinton S. Golden, executive vice-president, United Steel Workers of America, C. I. O.

The contest was opened on the evening of March 17 with a nationwide radio broadcast

The War Kitchen is in receipt of a letter from a reader in Euclid, Ohio, who asks for recipes for overseas cookies. These recipes were published in the Glasilo before Christmas and it was the hope of the writer that they should have been saved, as a repetition of one and the same recipes cannot be published time and time again. The reader is referred to the back editions of the War Kitchen for these recipes.

This week a few new ones are added for the benefit of all of the readers—but please cut them out and save them, so you won't have to ask for them again.

Chinese Chews

1 cup dates, ground, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup English walnut meats, cut, ¼ cup cake flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, ¼ teaspoon salt.

Mix together the dry ingredients. Put in nuts and dates and well beaten eggs last. Bake in a sheet as thin as possible 15 to 20 minutes. Cut in small squares and roll. Then dip in powdered sugar. The older they get the better they are.

Mincemeat Spice Cookies

3 cups sifted flour, ½ teaspoon baking soda, ¼ teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon ginger, ½ cup shortening, ¼ cup firmly packed brown sugar, ½ cup molasses, 2 egg yolks, well beaten, 1 1/3 cups mincemeat.

Mix and sift flour, soda, salt and ginger. Cream shortening and brown sugar, then beat in molasses and egg yolks; gradually stir in flour, then mincemeat. Drop from teaspoon on greased baking sheet and bake in moderately hot oven about 10 minutes. Makes 4½ dozen cookies.

Peanut Butter Nuggets

1 cup peanut butter, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, ¼ teaspoon salt, 1 1/3 cups sweetened condensed milk, 1 cup chopped raisins.

Mix together peanut butter, lemon juice, and salt; gradually stir in condensed milk then the raisins. Drop from teaspoon on greased baking sheet and bake in moderately hot oven about 10 minutes. Makes 3 dozen cookies.

Peanut Fingers

¼ cup shortening, 1 cup brown sugar, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, ¾ cup cake flour, ½ teaspoon baking powder, ¼ teaspoon salt, 1 cup chopped walnuts.

Cream together the shortening and the sugar; add the eggs, well beaten, and the vanilla. Sift the dry ingredients together and stir in the nuts. Combine with the first mixture. Transfer to a shallow oiled pan. Make the batter ¼ inch thick. Bake in a hot oven, 375 degrees for about 20 minutes. When cool cut in finger length pieces.

Twinkles

¾ cup shortening, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 egg, 4 tablespoons molasses, 2½ cups sifted flour, ¼ teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons soda, ½ teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon ginger.

Mix all together and shape into balls the size of a walnut and dip tops in sugar. They spread out by themselves. Bake 12 to 15 minutes in a 375 degree oven. Makes 3 to 4 dozen cookies.

Banana Oatmeal Cookies

1½ cups sifted flour, ½ teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon nutmeg, ¼ teaspoon cinnamon, ¾ cup shortening, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 cup mashed bananas, 1½ cups rolled oats, ½ cup chopped nutmeats.

Sift together flour, soda, salt and spices. Beat shortening until creamy. Add sugar gradually and continue beating until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat well. Add bananas, rolled oats and nut meats and mix thoroughly. Add flour mixture and blend. Drop by teaspoonsfuls onto ungreased cookie pans about 1½ inches apart. Bake in a moderately hot oven about 15 minutes, or until cookies are done. Remove baked cookies from pan at once. Makes about 3½ dozen.

IN THE HOME OFFICE, JOLIET, ILLINOIS

(Continuation)

THIRD SESSION, JANUARY 30, A. M.

Supreme President John Germ called the session to order at 9:30 A. M. Rev. Father Butala lead in prayer.

The minutes of the two previous sessions were read by Brother Zeleznikar. Minutes accepted as read.

Brother Zalar reports that the surety bonds of the Supreme Officers and those of the secretaries and treasurers of the local societies, totalling \$1,884.20 had been renewed and remitted. Action approved.

The statement of the legal counsel for K. S. K. J. amounting to \$232.25 was presented.

Brother Lokar moves, Brother Math Pavlakovich seconds the approval of the payment. Accepted.

Brother Supreme Secretary reports that license to conduct business in the State of California had been issued on October 19, 1944. Two K. S. K. J. societies now operate in California. At present our Union has license to conduct business in twenty states. Report acknowledged.

Brother Zalar then read three protesting resolutions objecting to the editorship of Glasilo, specifically, objecting to the publication of European "politics."

Unanimously agreed that the matter be referred to the Publication committee with instructions that the committee inform and demand that in the future the Editor abide by the by-laws of the K. S. K. J. as specified in Section 15, article b).

Following a lengthy discussion, it was decided that the protests be incorporated in the minutes, with the reservation, that the Editor has the right to explain and defend his opinion. Accepted.

The protests read as follows:

Dear Supreme Officers:

As pastor of a Catholic Slovenian Parish, I have charge of the religious convictions and well-being among the Slovenes of this community:

As spiritual advisor of all three local K. S. K. J. societies, and

As a member of the Union and St. Joseph Society, No. 110, I emphatically protest to the articles published in Glasilo pertaining to European Slovene politics.

Glasilo publishes articles in a manner that impresses the readers that the only salvation for the Slovene nation is with the Partisans, that Tito is its sole liberator, and that the future of the Slovenian nation rests in Russia's embrace.

It is not only I, either among the clergy, or among the Catholic laity, who is absolutely opposed to the opinion, that Tito is the leader in the transition from one tyranny to another—a worse period of communism. It will be a great disaster for the Catholic Slovene nation should they be dominated by the rule of Moscow Communism. Such are Tito and his followers.

Therefore, I cannot calmly stand by while Glasilo of a Catholic K. S. K. J. propagates among the Catholic Slovenes a communistic tyranny for the Slovene nation in the Old Country. This creates the impression among Catholics that the nation antedates Faith! which is absolutely faulty idealism.

I am convinced, that if the problem were brought before our Bishops, the articles of a Catholic Union would be condemned.

I know—and deeply regret—that the opinion of the members on this question is divided. Therefore, the least I can request that the Supreme Committee forbid the editor to publish all propaganda, all interference in the question and all publication of letters from the Old Country which are all partisan propaganda (for any letter contrary to this would not pass partisan censors). We are unable to judge fairly the exact state of affairs in Europe.

Should the Supreme Committee neglect to settle this matter and allow Glasilo to continue publishing propaganda for Tito and the partisans, I shall be forced to deduce the consequence and take further steps to preserve our Catholic Slovenes from communistic propaganda and encouragement for a new dictatorship over the Slovenes.

Catholic weekly for the publication of the Slovenian American National Council reports and partisans' propaganda. The members consider that the resignation of Mr. Zalar from the SANC committee had officially severed the relation of K. S. K. J. and that space for such reports be curbed.

I.

In regard to Slovenian American National Council scripts, I have not published any, for I do not approve of disputes, attacks and partialities. In issue No. 49, dated December 6, I printed an interesting letter of Rev. Modsta Golja, pastor in Metlika and in issue No. 50, December 13, an excellent report "Epic of Yugoslav Courage." Our countrymen in Yugoslavia are deserving of sympathy!

The annual report of Slovenian American National Council is included in this week's Glasilo. A report of this nature surely can not do any harm, for our own members have contributed into this fund. The signatures of two Supreme Officers appear on the report!

In this respect and manner I intend to conduct myself in regard to future SANC reports.

II.

After thirty years experience as editor, I can readily judge that the publication of the death of a person is essential for our newspaper regardless of the fact that he may or may not be a member. Glasilo is read throughout the U.S.A.; any one can learn that a relative, friend or countryman in Cleveland has passed on. The publication Prosveta reports death notices on its front page daily.

I shall continue this practice in the future, in spite of the fact that one of a total of 176 societies does not approve.
