## Indians Announce Starting Times

Cleveland, Ohio — There will be five different starting times for games played at home by the Cleveland Indians this year, it was announced today by Roger Peckinpaugh, vice-president and general manager.

So many different starting times are necessary, according to Peckinpaugh, because of the Cleveland club's desire to make the games available to workers in defense plants in this territory.

Here is the schedule of starting times for the Indians' games:

Week-days—4 p. m.

Saturdays—2 p. m.

Sundays—3 p. m.

Double-headers—1:30 p. m.

Night games—9:15 p. m.

A special effort is being made to cater to defense workers at week-day games, when all games will start at 4 o'clock, thus giving workers who quit on the 3 o'clock shifts plenty of time to get from their plants to League Park for the start of the games.

With only one or two exceptions all week-day games, except where they fall on holidays, are scheduled for League Park, which is located closer to the city's defense plants than the Stadium. All Sunday, holiday and night game and a few Saturday games are to be held in the Stadium.

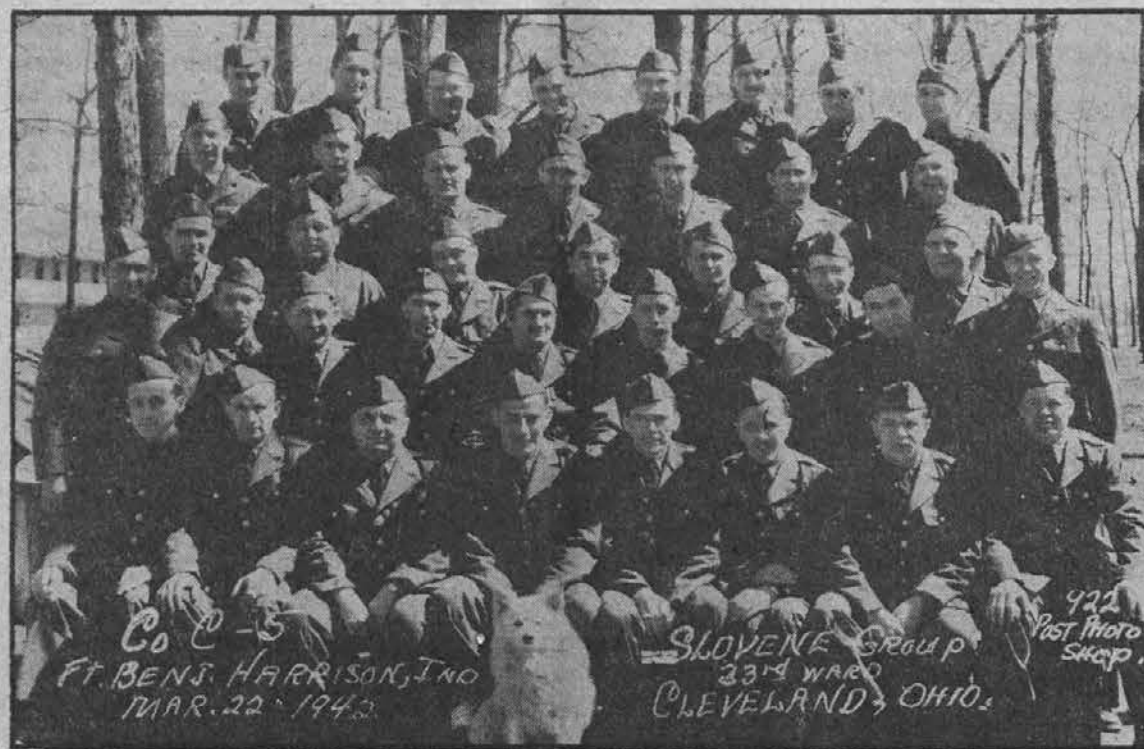

### Gala Concert and Dance at S. N. Home

There have been concerts and concerts at the Slovenian National Home, 6417 St. Clair Avenue, but never before, a concert by the combined musical clubs of Case School of Applied Science—"the training school for Engineers." On Friday evening, April 17, 1942, at 7:30 p. m. the musical clubs of Case will present a program of wide variety and interest, sponsored by the Yugoslav University Club of Cleveland, for the benefit of the Scholarship Fund. After this concert there will be dancing to Johnny Pecon's orchestra. General admission is 55c; patron, \$1.00; dancing only 40c, tickets obtained at the door.

In perusing over the directory of 1941-1942 of Case School one sees that the Yugoslavs are well represented in the student body—there being about 26 students enrolled in day and night classes. Among them is Albert Gregoric, member of the Yugoslav University Club. He is a junior and is studying chemical engineering. He is also a member of the Case School Orchestra. There are also two Yugoslavs on the Faculty—Mathew M. Braidech, Associate Professor of Chemical Engineering and John J. Jacklitch, Jr., Assistant in Mechanical Engineering.

Ten years ago, Professor Braidech, or "Uncle Matt," or "Butch" as he is more affectionately called by his students, was one of the organizers of the Yugoslav University Club. He was president of the Club in 1934-1935. Professor Braidech certainly belongs in the category of "local boy makes good."

He is the son of Mathew Braidech, Sr., of 1191 Norwood Rd., and brother of Dr. F. N. Braidech, DDS. He is a graduate of East Tech School, and in 1925 graduated from Ohio State University. He was Chief Chemist at the Baldwin Reservoir from 1926 to 1936. In the fall of 1936, he was appointed Associate Professor of Chemical Engineering by Dr. Wm. Wickenden, President of Case. In 1939 he became Associate Professor of Chemical Engineering. At the convention of the American Water Works Association last June in Toronto, he was elected National Chairman for 1941-1942.

Professor Braidech also won the John Goodell award for the outstanding contribution in Sanitary Engineering at the American Water Works Asso-

ciation Convention at Los Angeles in 1935. At present he is consultant to a number of defense industries. He is also listed in the "Who's Who of the American Men of Science," and in "Who's Who in Engineering."
