Andrea Wieser Led Protocol Office for Athens Olympic Games – Carinthian Slovene

Andrea Wieser, 34, a Slovene from the Austrian province of Carinthia, was in charge of the protocol office in Athens, Greece, for the International Olympic Committee last summer. She was in charge of making the arrangements for visiting dignitaries, including kings and presidents, who attended part or all the Games. This included greeting the guests at the Athens airport, organizing the transportation convoys, security, housing and seating arrangements, etc. She had a staff of 15 under her and help from some 50 additional personnel.

Miss Wieser, born in 1970 in Celovec, Austria, is a 1988 graduate of the Slovene Gymnasium there, then studied English and American Studies at the University of Salzburg, where she earned her Ph.D. in 1997. In 1994




Bishop Uran is new Ljubljana Archbishop

LJUBLJANA, Oct. 25 – Pope John Paul II has appointed Ljubljana Auxiliary Bishop Alojz Uran as the new Ljubljana archbishop and Slovenian Metropolitan today. Uran will officially succeed his predecessor Dr. Franc Rode at an inauguration ceremony on Dec. 5 at the Ljubljana Cathedral.

Bishop Uran has served as Auxiliary of the archdiocese of Ljubljana (population 906,430, Catholics 715,084, priests 563, permanent deacons 4, religious 771).



Life in the Refugee Camps 1949

Friday, Aug. 26, 1949

Karl and I began building shipping crates for the trip to America. We obtained some boards and metal strips to hold them together. The boards are from barracks in the camp that are being torn down as more and more refugees leave for other countries.

Monday, Aug. 29, 1949

I wrote a number of letters to friends and relatives, and received our first letter from our sponsors in Willard, Wisconsin. He is 65 years old and his wife is 58. They have 100 acres of farmland and 24 cows. They've been waiting for us for a long time. Why haven't we received approval to emigrate yet?

Wednesday, Aug. 31, 1949

This month I collected 520 shillings in tips for distributing mail in the camp, plus I made 50 shillings selling newspapers.

Thursday, Sept. 1, 1949

At the post office I met Mr. Veigl, with whom we did business before the war. He was a salesman for an Austrian company that sold special sewing machines for shoes. Just before the war began, he was at our shoemakers' cooperative trying to convince me that Germany had no intention of occupying Yugoslavia.

Hans and Mila Huber arrived by motorcycle this afternoon and visited with us for two hours.

From 7 - 9 p.m., I went to English and Spanish classes. An Englishman from the Linguaphone company was also there.

Friday, Sept. 2, 1949

At 9 a.m., about 50 people left for America, among them our good friends Karel and Mici Erznoznik with their 2-year-old daughter Jolanda. Mici was crying because Jolanda had become sick from a vaccine. Karl had been excited about leaving for America, but today he was more subdued.

After they left, everyone competed to carry off what was left in Karl and Mici's room. Karl had quite a supply of firewood.

The Austrian police now have a permanent station in our camp.

Saturday, Sept. 3, 1949

This afternoon I repaired shoes. In the evening, I went around collecting contributions for my letter carrier duties. I collected 150 shillings.

Sunday, Sept. 4, 1949

I wrote a letter to our sponsor, Ceferin, in Argentina. We still don't know if we will go to Argentina or

America.

Monday, Sept. 5, 1949
Our English class is done because the teacher no longer has time to teach us.

Tuesday, Sept. 6, 1949

I sent a 20 pound package to Cilka's mother in Slovenia. Hot today.

The Srsen family received word yesterday that they have a sponsor in America. The Lunder family received a similar notice today.

I bought 2 pounds of margarine for 8 shillings and 1 pound of pork for 24 shillings. For many years in the refugee camps, we had to eat potatoes with little or no butter or margarine. Now we finally have enough, partly because our friend Silva sent some extra ration cards.

Arl and Kamensek moved into Karl's room.

Friday, Sept. 9, 1949

A large number of new refugees arrived in the camp, on their way to Australia.

Saturday, Sept. 10, 1949

435 people left for Australia, among them only one family that we know – Sepetovec.

Sunday, Sept. 11, 1949

I wrote my first English letter to our acquaintance Paulin in New York.

Unfortunately, this is a sad time of the year for me for October 20 marked the second year since Josephine's death. They say as time goes on it gets easier, but it is hard for me to realize for at times it seems that one day is lonelier than the day before. I had a Mass for Josephine as well as made the dreadful trip to the cemetery to take flowers to her grave. Without a doubt perhaps losing one's mate is the hardest thing in life to face. Perhaps if it were not for Josephine's dog, Harry, the carin terrier, it would be more lonely, but I guess he realizes how lovely I get at times that he follows me constantly.

This past week the contractor came to rebuild my chimney and needless to say it was in dire need of total repair and I really wanted to get it repaired for "Santa," but then I should not get excited about that for over the years he has failed time and time again to bring me an electric train. With my luck, by the time I get up to St. Peter's place, he will tell me he does not have 110 current.

Anyway, back to the brick layer and perhaps what surprised me most was that he brought his young wife with him. At first I thought perhaps she would simply sit in the truck and wait until he was done, but I was amazed to no end when she slipped on a pair of coveralls, got her gloves and was up on the roof with him, carrying the old bricks to the side and throwing them into their

Soon she was going up and down the ladder carrying new bricks to her husband up on the roof and then making the cement mortar. He laid the bricks into place and she followed by striking up the joints. She then took the push broom up to the roof to sweep any light litter and then hosed down the roof.

They were a young couple, perhaps in their late 40s for she said she had four grown children. That is what one calls working together and perhaps in them working together day in and day out is what makes their marriage so solid. I was kidding him and told him that when he goes to bed at night and prays, "Now I lay me down to sleep, pray the Lord my soul to keep," that he should also remember to thank God for giving him such a wonderful wife that works right along beside him. He smiled and said, "You are right, Ray; I'll remember that."

Watching them, one can't help but wonder that their marriage was truly meant to be made in heaven. They said they were married for over 25 years already. Wish all couples can be as happy as they are. They did state they always have jobs to do as far as brick laying, and she said that in the winter months they keep busy taking snow and ice out of the eves and gutters.

As you can see I refrained from writing about the Army Reserves but there is sun on the horizon; they did put on a turkey dinner, but you will never guess how. But I will leave that for another article.

Instead, let's take a trip back in history. How about 1927, but my memory is faint going back that far. In Germany, Black Friday occurs on May 13, 1927 when the country's economy began to collapse. After selling more than 15 million Model T cars, Ford faces a slumping sales even at \$1,200 per vehicle. The company stops production and retools for a new car, the Model "A."

ATT&T begins transatlantic telephone service via the radio, initially beginning between the United States and London. At first only one call at a time is possible at \$75.00 for the first three minutes. I remember when I made my first long distance call from Germany when I was in the Service back in 1948-49-50-51 and even then it was \$15.00 for three minutes. We have to admit that by today's standards, we have come a long way.

Remember some of the prices? First Class stamp was 2 cents, a record was 30 cents and admission to the Savoy Ballroom was 50 cents. (I did not go; I did not have two cents to scratch against each other).

A man's suit with a vest and two pair of pants was \$18.85 and a racoon coat cost \$39.50 and a console radio cost \$72.50. The Cadillac La Salle cost \$2,495 plus with a few added features the cost ran up to \$2,685. Those were the good old days for today a Cadillac can run as high as \$50,000, and once again I don't have the two cents to rub together to buy one.

Well, enough about 1927 and time for a joke if you are ready. A minister decided that a visual demonstration would add emphasis to his Sunday service. Four worms were placed into four separate jars. The first worm was placed in a jar of alcohol, the second was put in a jar of cigarette smoke, the third worm was placed in a jar of sperm and the fourth was put in a jar of clean soil. At the





Lemon Cheesecake

134 C graham cracker crumbs

1/4 C brown sugar

1 t grated lemon zest

1/2 C melted butter, cooled

2 lb. cream cheese at room temperature

1 C sugar

1 C heavy cream

3 T fresh lemon juice

2 t grated lemon zest

1 T water

1 t unflavored gelatin

Directions:

In a mixer, mix cream cheese and sugar on medium speed until blended. Beat in half of the cream, lemon juice and lemon zest. Place the water in a small saucepan. Sprinkle the gelatin over the water and let soften for 5 minutes. Place the pan over low heat and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Gradually mix in the remaining cream. Add the gelatin mixture into the cream cheese mixture and beat until fluffy. Spoon the filling over the cooled crust. Cover with foil and chill overnight.

Garnish with lemon slices. Serves 12.

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
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Barbara Bush in Cleveland

Barbara Bush, mother of President George W. Bush, and wife of former President George Bush, was at the Strongsville (Ohio) Civic Center on Monday, Oct. 25.

Rarely has a First Lady been greeted by the American people and the press with the approbation and warmth accorded to Barbara Pierce Bush. Perhaps this is prompted by the image she calls "everybody's grandmother." People are comfortable with her white hair, her warm, relaxed manner, and her keen wit. With characteristic directness, she says people like her because they know "I'm fair and I like children and I adore my husband."

In the suburban town of Rye, New York, Barbara had a happy childhood. She went to boarding school at Ashley Hall in South Carolina, and it was at a dance during Christmas vacation when she was only 16 that she met George Bush, a senior at Phillips Academy in Andover, Massachusetts. They became engaged a year-anda-half later, just before he went off to war as a Navy torpedo bomber pilot.

On January 6, 1945 they were married. After the war George graduated from Yale, and they set out for Texas to start their lives together. Six children were born to them.

When her husband was away, she became the family linchpin, providing everything from discipline to carpools. The death of their daughter Robin from leukemia when she was not quite four left George and Barbara Bush with a lifelong compassion. She says, "Because of Robin, George and I love every living human more."

Today Barbara Bush lives in a home she and her husband built in Houston, Texas, where she enjoys being part of the community. Their children and grandchildren visit them often in Houston and at the family summer home in Kennebunkport, Maine.

Devoted to her family, Mrs. Bush still finds time to work on an autobiography, serve on the Boards of AmeriCares and the Mayo Clinic, and continues her prominent role in the Barbara Bush Foundation.

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Finding a 'brother' in ruins of Europe

by Father Bazilij Valentine OFM Translated by Jo Gerden in Melbourne, Australia

VETRINJE, Austria, 1945 - I will never forget those blessed evenings in the Tyrol, when my heart at last became peaceful as if I could forget the trauma I lived through. In the little church atop the cropped high rocks the only bell toll sounded pleasantly among the high standing pines. Somewhere over the land cows were stretching and slowly mooing. A soft foggy veil was lowering over the valley and hugging the hamlets pressed upon the hillock. In the peaceful dusk Kristeinbach rustled louder over the cliff onward to the valley below. Its sounds did not bother me at all; it made me rather

Each nightfall I sat on the bench beside the cross looking at the windows of attractive Tyrolean dwellings upon the hillock which lightened up one after another. Looking mischievously and winking while outrunning the stars of the evening sky which as slowly darkening.

At such moments the storm within me calmed down, which surprised me again and again. How is this possible at all? Where comes my immense inner peace, even though I am so far from my homeland and my own, as troublesome doubts from the bloody memories of Vetrinje are gnawing at me all day.

Yes, Tyrolean evenings always brought me tranquillity.

Always? No. One of them, the evening of the ninth of June the year of the Lord's visit one thousand nine hundred and forty-five reminded me again that my homeland, Slovenia is far, so far away...

I sat as usual on the bench beside the cross and looked over Kristein which was sinking more and more into the stillness of night. The guitar was lying beside me. The house girl, Matilda, was playing it before she ran home with her little brother.

Steps echoed on the road from Ried. By the outline of a slim figure I recognized from afar who was coming. A Cossack of my age, in Russian army pants and a torn Tyrolean jacket, who had often begged from my foster father. He was one of those they want to return to Russia, but he successfully escaped from the Pegges' camp. He was hiding up on the mountains - as hundreds of others - and kept coming to peasants for food. The

only arms left to this quiet and reserved lad was a dagger whose handle was poking out of his right boot.

We often saw each other at Oberwasserlechner, exchanged our greetings and parted our own ways. Surely he knew that I was a refugee, as I knew him to be also. But we both had our own thoughts and although we were close because of our common fate, our languages, our nationality and religion separated us. He was too reserved and suspicious that I would annoy him.

Again one evening we greeted each other and the boy somberly wanted to pass me by. Suddenly his eyes noticed the guitar resting on the bench and lit up with longing. His lips moved slightly. For a moment he couldn't quite decide. Perhaps he had lost all his faith in good people and feared he would be rejected.

"May I?" he finally asked in Russian.

I nodded.

He stepped up and reached out for the guitar. He lifted it slightly, as if he was afraid that he could hurt it.

A gloomy smile formed charming dimples in his cheeks when he sat next to me and arranged his fingers on the strings.

My attention captured, I watched him. But he dared not start. He looked somewhere over the hillock on the other side of the stream and fought his inner battle. As if he knew the song would overwhelm him, but he wouldn't like to show his emotions to a stranger.

I understood him and gently put my hand onto his shoulder. He looked at me gratefully and then his finnervously started strumming the strings. First gentle so that even the quiet tunes overwhelmed me. I never heard anyone playing like that. The sounds were pouring into a single song of a wounded heart that pierced my inner soul and overwhelmed me with its gentle melancholy. Heartfelt grief and anguish were sung by chords, which were becoming ever stronger. Finally, it resounded as if it wanted to shout out the tempest of injustices that had so heartlessly raged over the Cossack, myself and millions of other refugees.

A peaceful Tyrolean evening was leaving my soul.

The stranger forgot I was sitting next to him. He closed his eyelids from where tear after tear slipped through. He didn't try to stop it. They slid over young, almost girlish, cheeks which yet hardly grew any fluff, but were al-

ready being cruelly beaten by a stormy life. His lips quivered. No longer could he command a raging pain in his chest: He poured it out into a gentle Russian song and I listened to him touched by it, sung in his clear tenor. He sang about his faraway land of vast steppes along a peaceful Don River, where his home stands and his mother keeps coming to the doorstep in vain hop to hear the horses trotting and spotting her Cossack son. About a glint of land which was confiscated, about a piece of bread, of a bunch of flowers from the neighbor's garden.

Peace, where are you? With each tone of his voice I felt a stronger sense within me that I am abroad, that I would never be home in the Tyrol. My peace dwindled as if the evening wind took it away. The storms of a foreign land raged within me: in that moment, all the unfairness stood before me that accompany refugees. Oh, you, hundred-times-over accursed from God himself. Who gave you the right to steal our homes? Who gave you the right over our lives? Executioners, executioners.

This moment has reconciled the unknown child of the vast Russian steppes with a son of mountainous Slovenian land. Into the Cossack's song stole my fate with his. A hand hugged tighter the boy's shoulders and the right hand reached for his.

"Thank you, brother." I said.

He became silent and looked at me as if he was ashamed of his own tears. Although he probably noticed that my eyes were also shiny, as he whispered the same word to me, "brother." Perhaps he felt for the first time abroad that someone shares a grief with him.

Then his fingers again found strings. Now no more gentle and considerate. Passionately he was hitting them. The memory of home lured from the boy a wild Cossack song in which he wanted to stifle his pain. It seemed to me as if he saw before him neighboring horses in the bloody turmoil of battle for the freedom of his homeland. As if he was standing on the banks of the river Don in awe of its waves. The song goes:

"Hey, our father, the tranquil Don,

"Hey, but why my tranquil Don, trundling on so troubled?

"Hey, why are you as red as blood?"

The song of languor, of love with hatred jointly, of trust and despair.

"Hey, our father, the

tranquil Don."

Exceptional harmony. His palm moved in a snap to silence the vibrating chords and pushed away the guitar. It seemed to me that he felt hatred for it, as it awoke in him longing for his home. I felt it, too. The Cossack's head collapsed as one dead onto his chest. He cried out...

I don't know how long we sat on the bench beside the cross. We told each other who we are and where we are from. We whispered our homelands as if we had known each other since our early days. We understood each other. A boy from the Russian steppes was the first one in a foreign land to whom I poured out my heartfelt grief. And I was also the first one to hear his story. We became brothers.

"God be with you, Vasja," I said at our parting.

"Until we meet again." he squeezed my hand.

That evening I couldn't fall asleep for a long time. The foreign land lay upon my breast as a heavy rock. Faraway, somewhere far beyond the mountains, I felt the heartbeat of my homeland, Slovenia.

Next night I was looking for Vasja in vain. He didn't come to Kristein. Never again. In the morning the Englishmen came with a tank and a truck. They were rounding up runaway Cossacks and the boy probably didn't think it would be safe.

Four days later we met somewhere else.

With a borrowed bicycle I rode to Lienz. In Thal I was stopped by soldiers who required my papers. An old worn out priest's collar helped me out of much trouble

When I sat on the bike again to continue my way, a truck pulled in behind me. How I hated this rumble as each army truck reminded me of the endless rows of transport from Vetrinje, carrying the laughter of our boys and the faces of our men etched with worries to a certain death, and I had almost gone with them, straight into the arms of the Kocevje pits.

I moved off the road so the truck could overtake me.

Am I perhaps wrong? Oh,

I was not wrong. In the open truck among the armed soldiers sat four people. The first look told me that the girl is Russian. Among the men, I recognized – Vasja.

"Vasja, Vasja," I shouted. I peddled my bicycle faster.

My brother had heard me. He turned and recognized me. He smiled sadly, then he lifted up his right hand and waved his last goodbye. The soldiers turned and heartlessly looked to see who he was waving at.

Noisily the truck drove further on. I felt a bitter lump in my throat. Vasja's only fault is that he is Russian. You are taking him to the executioners, as you took thousands of our men. You are selling us like cattle.

I stopped in the middle of the road and watched the truck until it disappeared behind the bend in the road.

"Until we meet again, Vasja," I thought.

A few months later, in the late afternoon, I went from Lienz's refugee camp towards Dolsach, where I wanted to ask some good people for a bite of bread. I suddenly stopped before a grave. Beyond the road gutter was a mound of earth with the Orthodox cross on it, put together by a quick hand without a tool. From there the letters stared at me, "Vasja Ivanov, VI. 1945."

It could not be.

It shook me up. Perhaps my brother is buried there. The month is right. The name is right, but the family name, unfortunately, I did not know. If he wanted to escape from the truck, they would have shot him.

I don't know why, but I was quite sure that I was standing before the grave of my Russian brother. The blond one, Vasja, who was robbed of everything and who will never see his homeland again. As his mother is waiting for him in vain on the doorsteps of his Cossack home near the River Don

Later, without telling anyone, I often visited the lonesome grave along the road before Dolsach. I cleared the mound of weeds and decorated it with flowers. It was so nice to sit beside it and listen to the song in the wind. It was the song of my Russian brother and there was no hatred any more, nor any despair. It was a song of forgiveness and peace.

"Life continues; it does not stop - neither because of injustices, neither because of death. Entire nations disappear from history and yet the world does not stop. In the graves of Teharje grass and wheat grows above them, and over a common ground grows bramble and clematis, but this dust is, besides good people in our homeland, the only thing that our native land still consecrates." – Karel Mauser.

It is published by Catholic Answers of El Cajon, California which was founded in 1979 by attorney Karl Keating. He was prompted to do so after he found literature loaded with misinformation about Catholic beliefs on his car after Sunday Mass; a local Fundamentalist church was the source of the leaflets.

The mission statement of Catholic Answers which is found on its website www.catholic.com - is:

Catholic Answers is an apostolate dedicated to serving Christ by bringing the fullness of Catholic truth to the world. We help good Catholics become better Catholics, bring former Catholics "home," and lead non-Catholics into the fullness of the faith. We explain Catholic truth, equip the faithful to live fully the sacramental life, and assist them in spreading the Good News.

The Guide has ten sections spread over 10 pages. The section headings are: How this voter's guide helps you; Your role as a Catholic voter; The five nonnegotiable issues; Which Political offices should I worry about?' How to determine a candidate's position; How not to vote; How to vote; When there is no 'acceptable' candidate; The role of your conscience; and

When you are done with this voter's guide.


The Guide is written in simple and straight-forward language that is easy to understand even though it relies on the following profound texts: the Catechism of the Catholic Church; from the Congregation of the Doctrine of the Faith, Doctrinal Notes on Some Questions regarding the Participation of Catholics in Political Life, Instruction on Respect for Human Life in Its Origin and on the Dignity of Procreation, and Consideration regarding Proposals to Give Legal Recognition to unions between Homosexual Persons; from the Pontifical Council for the Family, Charter of the Rights of the Family; and from John Paul II, Evangelium Vitae (the Gospel of Life).

Five issues are identified as "Non-Negotiable" and further discussed (1) Abortion; (2) Euthanasia; (3) Fetal Stem Cell Research; (4) Human Cloning; and (5) Homosexual 'Marriage.' These issues carry the gravest moral weight, and, accordingly, they are most destructive of the common good. Thus, if a candidate supports, directly or indirectly, one of these issues, then a Catholic must not vote for that candidate.





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Vesti iz Slovenije

Mons. Alojzij Uran imenovan za novega ljubljanskega nadškofa in metropolita -Umestitev bo v nedeljo, 5. decembra

V ponedeljek opoldne je bilo uradno razglašeno po Sloveniji, da bo naslednik nadškofa dr. Franca Rodeta, ki je prevzel nove dolžnosti v Vatikanu že aprila meseca, 59 let stari ljubljanski pomožni škof Alojzij Uran. Imenovanje je presenetilo skoro vse, kajti so prej krožila druga imena. Zanimivo naključje je, da se je škof Uran v tednu pred razglasitvijo nove funkcije mudil med Slovenci iz ZDA in Kanade na letošnjih Baragovih dnevih v severnem Michiganu. Sicer je bila zadnja leta med njegovimi formalnimi dolžnostmi tudi skrb za Slovence po svetu in je v tej vlogi večkrat obiskal Slovence od Avstralije do ZDA in Kanade. Novoizvoljeni parlament že zaseduje s svojim vodstvom – Janezu Janši še ni uspelo sestaviti vladne koalicije

Predsednik Slovenije Janez Drnovšek je Janezu Janši poveril mandat za sestavo vlade. Slednji vodi zadnje tedne od volitev dalje intenzivne pogovore o tem, kakšna bo lahko vladajoča koalicija. Rok ima Janša Pač do 21. novembra. Težava ni v tem, da bodo jedro koalicije stranke SDS (Janševa) poslanci, NSi z 9 in SLS s 7. Ti tri stranke tako imajo natanko polovico sedežev v parlamentu: 45. Za golo večino pa je potrebnih 46, zato mora Janša najti eno stranko za sodelovanje v koaliciji. Poštev, kot kaže, pride najprvo DeSUS, njej je pa dokaj nesoglasja. Menda je Predsednik Anton Rous precej naklonjen Sodelovanju v vladi, so pa drugi v stranki bolj zadržani. Zanimiva možnost je Združe-

na lista oz. bivši komunisti. V tej stranki je še vedno veliko nasprotovanje temu, da bi stranka kot taka postala del v močnem bistvu desne koalicije. SNS (Zmago Jelinčič) se je izjavila za "lojalno opozicijo", so pa govorice, da bi bila tudi v njej frakcija, ki ne bi izključevala sodelovanja v vladi.

Po daljšem razpravljanju so poslanci le rešili problem, kje bodo razne stranke sedele v poslanski dvorani. Sredino so zavzeli poslanci SDS in del poražencev iz LDS, 3 iz LDS bodo na desni, tam bosta tudi poslanca narodnosti in 6 poslancev SNS, skrajno desno so poslanci SLS. Na levi strani so 4 poslanci DeSUS, ZLSD in NSi (ti so sicer sosedje SDS.

Na tajnem glasovanju je kandidat za predsednika parlamenta Franc Cukjati iz SDS (61 let, končal filozofijo v Zagrebu, teologijo v Nemčiji, 1978 diplomiral na medicinski fakulteti v Ljubljani, zdravnik splošne medicine, oče štirih otrok, velik nasprotnik oploditve z biomedicinsko pomočjo) dobil 58 glasov. Zå tehnično funkcijo generalnega sekretarja državnega zbora je bil izvoljen Lovro Lončar. Predsednik NSi Andrej Bajuk ni kandidiral za predsednika DZ in je menda pričakovanje, da bo v Janševi vladi zasedel mesto finančnega ministra.

Možnosti glede nove vlade so baje še precej odprte, vse pa kaže, da računa Janša na končno privolitev DeSUS. Izjavil je: "Zagotovo bo DeSUS dobila ustrezen resor, glede na svojo težo. In to bo pravi resor, ne takšen, kot ga je imela v dosedanji vladi ... 51 glasov (tu računa Janša tudi na podporo obeh poslancev narodnosti) je povsem solidna večina. Ne zanima pa nas samo izvolitev vlade, ampak tudi poznejša podpora vladi." Andrej Bajuk je dejal, da ostaja solidna Koalicija Slovenija (SDS-NSi).

Msgr. Alojz Uran, novi ljubljanski nadškof in metropolit



Ljubljana (Tiskovni urad Slovenske škofovske konference, 25. okt. 2004, poslano po e-mailu Philipu Hrvatinu v Cleveland, od njega lastniku AD Jamesu Debevcu, od njega uredniku za slovenski del AD.)

Zvonovi ljubljanskih cerkva so v ponedeljek, 25. oktobra 2004, opoldne, slovesno naznanili, da je sveti oče papež Janez Pavel II. dosedanjega ljubljanskega pomožnega škofa msgr. Alojza Urana imenoval za novega ljubljanskega nadškofa in metropolita. Ljubljanski nadškofijski sedež je bil izpraznjen z imenovanjem in odhodom nadškofa dr. Franca Rodeta, 21. aprila 2004, v Rim, za prefekta Kongregacije za ustanove posvečenega in skupnosti apostolskega življenja.

Msgr. Alojz Uran se je rodil 22. januarja 1945 v Spodnjih Pirničah v župniji Šmartno pod Šmarno Goro v kmečki družini kot zadnji od treh otrok. Maturiral je leta 1964 na bežigrajski gimnaziji. Po študiju na Teološki fakulteti v Ljubljani ga je nadškof Jožef Pogačnik na praznik apostolov sv. Petra in Pavla 29. junija 1970, posvetil v duhovnika. Novo mašo je imel 12. julija 1970 v domači župniji Šmartno Šmarno Goro.

Svojo prvo duhovniško službo je kot stolni vikar (kaplan) nastopil v stolni župniji sv. Nikolaja v Ljubljani, kjer je ostal do leta 1973. Od leta 1973 do 1977 je bil na študiju v Rimu. Na katehetskem inštitutu pedagoške fakultete Papeške salezijanske univerze je opravil katehetsko pedagoško specializacijo in leta 1977 študij zaključil z magisterijem o katehezi odraslih.

Po vrnitvi v Ljubljano je istega leta postal rektor malega semenišča pri sv. Petru v Ljubljani. Leta 1980 je bil imenovan za župnika velike župnije Ljubljana - Šentvid in jo opravljal vse do škofovskega imenovanja.

To so bila leta intenzivnega in zelo uspešnega pastoralnega dela, ko se je seznanil s problemi sodobne pastorale. Poleg tega je bil od leta 1981 prodekan zahodnega dela ljubljanske dekanije in pozneje dekan nanovo ustanovljene dekanije Ljubljana - Šenivid.

Dne 16. decembra 1992, ga je sveti oče papež Janez Pavel II. imenoval za ljubljanskega pomožnega škofa. 31. decembra 1992 je bil imenovan za kanonika in dekana stolnega kapitlja ter za arhidiakona prvega arhidiakonata.

Na praznik Gospodovega razglašenja 6. januarja 1993, ga je v škofa v Rimu posvetil papež Janez Pavel II. Ob posvečenju si je za škofovsko geslo izbral geslo: "Da, Oče".

Msgr. Alojz Uran je 34. rezidenčni škof ljubljanske nadškofije in četrti metropolit po obnovi ljubljanske metropolije leta 1969 ali peti metropolit v zgodovini ljubljanske (nad)škofije.

Bil je član Škofijskega in Medškofijskega katehetskega sveta, član in voditelj komisije za duhovne poklice ter predavatelj na Teološko-pastoralni šoli, ki deluje v okviru Teološke fakultete v Ljubljani, v Novem mestu, v Kopruin v Novi Gorici.

Bil je tudi voditelj Škofijskega odbora za duhovne poklice in odgovoren za duhovne poklice pri Slovenski škofovski konferenci. Leta 1996 je pripravljal in koordiniral prvi papežev obisk v Sloveniji. Od leta 2000 je delegat SSK za pastoralo med Slovenci po svetu.

Skoraj enajst let je ob številnih birmah in slovesnostih ter na pastoralnih obiskih dobro spoznal župnije v nadškofiji. V župnije je vedno prinašal vedrino in utrjeval vernike v veri in v trdnem upanju v zmago dobrote in pravičnosti.

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Vatikan je presenetil z izborom Alojzija Urana

Ljubljana (Delo, 26. oktobra) – "Sveti oče je za novega ljubljanskega nadškofa in metropolita imenoval Alojzija Urana ... To je dobra novica," je med drugim dejal nuncij Santos Abril y Castello na včerajšnji izredno dobro obiskani tiskovni konferenci na sedežu ljubljanske nadškofije točno opoldne.

Dober teden stara odločitev Svetega sedeža je bila presenečenje tudi za najvišje predstavnike Cerkve na Slovenskem. Po nuncijevi oceni Uran zelo dobro pozna škofijo, duhovnike in druge pastoralne sodelavce. V krajšem nagovoru pa je Uran med drugim zaprosil za "dovolj razsvetljenja in moči za težko in odgovorno nalogo".

Slovesna "umestitev" novega, 59-letnega nadškofa bo predvidoma 5. decembra v ljubljanski stolnici, do takrat pa bo nadškofijo vodil sedanji upravitelj škof Andrej Glavan. Nadškofijski se-

dež je bil izpraznjen od 21. aprila letos, ko je dotedanji nadškof Franc Rode odšel v Rim za prefekta kongregacije za duhovnike in redovnike.

V uvodnem nagovoru je Uran ponovil svoje škofovsko geslo Da, Oče, ki si ga je izbral pred dvanajstimi leti. V tem geslu Uran po svojih besedah vidi vse svoje upanje in delo. Po svojih močeh po poskušal uresničiti to geslo, da bi vedno in povsod izpolnil, kar Bog pričakuje od njega.

Med odgovori na novinarska vprašanja je Uran dejal, da bodo prvi koraki pri urejanju odnosa med Cerkvijo in državo nadaljevanje tega, kar je postavljeno na trdne temelje z mednarodnim sporazumom med Slovenijo in Svetim sedežem in kjer je po njegovih besedah tudi nakazano nadaljnje reševanje odprtih vprašanj.

Na vprašanje, ali se za predstavnika "mehke" ali "sredinske" linije v Cerkvi, je Uran dejal, da se ne spomni, da bi kdaj rekel, da je "sredinec". Po njegovem je vsaka oseba edinstvena in vsak škof je svoja osebnost, sam pa bo poskušal nadaljevati zavzeto delo predhodnikov, predvsem iz prejšnjega stoletja, ki so postavili zdrave osnove za prihodnje delo.

ALOJZ URAN

Kar zadeva Slovenijo, je v rimskokatoliški Cerkvi ta čas prevladala linija, ki se zavzema za dialog, za spravne čase, za miren in strpen pogovor, ne za zaostrovanje ali napenjanje strun. Odločili so se za človeka, ki zna stopiti iz fare v faro, se pogovoriti z ljudmi in duhovniki, se jim približati in jih tudi privabiti. Take ocene je slišati za vatikanskimi zidovi po tem, ko je vse po vrsti presenetila novica, da je novi ljubljanski nadškof in slovenski metropolit Alojz Uran in ne kdo iz cele vrste ljudi, imen, ki so krožila po hodnikih zadnje mesece in niso čisto nič kriva, da so jih reševalci križank vpletali v take in drugačne kombinacije.

Škofov, ki delujejo v državah nekdanjega socialističnega bloka, mednje pa v vatikanski razpredelnici še vedno sodi tudi Slovenija, ne izbirajo kot škofe v tako imenovanem normalnem svetu. Imenujejo jih neposredno v državnem tajništvu, se pravi v vatikanski vladi in diplomaciji. Odločitev ima v primerih držav onkraj nekdanje železne zavese praviloma tudi politične razsežnosti.

Politične dimenzije morda celo prevladujejo, ko se najvplivnejši vatikanski politiki opredeljujejo o imenih škofov in nadškofov. Tako utegne ostati še precej časa, kajti prehodno obdobje v vatikanskem primeru traja dlje, kakor je v navadi drugod. Tak odnos Svetega sedeža zajema zelo široko območje, ki seže od Slovenije do Rusije in od Bolgarije do Poljske. Tudi Poljsko uvrščajo na ta posebni seznam, pa čeprav od tam prihaja sedanji papež.

Alojz Uran je bil gotovo izbran po izjemno tehtnem premisleku, kar je tudi sicer značilno za prav vse odločitve, ki jih sprejemajo v vrhu katoliške Cerkve v Rimu. Koliko so na odločitev vplivali slovenski najvišji in najvplivnejši predstavniki v Cerkvi, je težko reči, bivši ljubljanski nadškof Franc Rode pa pravi, da je v Vatikan vsak pristojen za svoje področje in se v druge sfere ne more oziroma tudi noče vtikati. To naj bi veljalo tudi zanj in za drugega zelo vplivnega Slovenca, Ivana Jurkoviča, ki je nuncij v Ukrajini in sodi v ožji visoki krog cerkvene diplomacije.

Alojz Uran je, tega ne skriva nihče med tukajšnjimi poznavalci slovenskih razmer, po načinu nastopanja in tudi po pogledih na slovensko vsakdanjost popolno nasprotje svojega predhodnika Franca Rodeta, do neke mere pa morda utegne nadaljevati linijo Rodetovega predhodnika Alojzija Šuštarja. K odločitvi, da bo novi nadškof in metropolit prav Uran, je gotovo prispevala njegova velika priljubljenost med Slovenci doma in tudi po svetu.

Zadnja leta je bil v ljubljanski nadškofiji prav Alojz Uran tisti, ki je hodil od fare do fare, se udeleževal prireditev, se znal pogovoriti s preprostimi verniki in zahtevnimi dvomljivci, velikokrat se je znal poveseliti in tako še bolj razumeti ljudi, ki v Cerkvi morda iščejo moralno oporo. V dobro mu štejejo tudi to, da se je znal posvetiti duhovnikom na terenu in tenkočutno prisluhniti njihovim mnenjem.

Izjemno spodbudne besede je o novem ljubljanskem nadškofu slišati tudi iz tujine, saj je bil celo petletko pristojen za stike s Slovenci po svetu. Hodil je po vseh državah, kjer živijo Slovenci, približati se je znal vsem, starim in mladim, prvi, drugi in tudi tretji generaciji izseljencev, pa naj pripadajo ekonomski ali pa politični emigraciji. Še posebno iz Argentine je bilo vedno slišati navdušujoče in pohvalne besede, zraven včasih tudi kakšno pripombo, da je Alojz Uran človek, ki morebitne požare raje gasi, kakor da bi jih podžigal.

Iz rimske perspektive se zdi odločitev vatikanskega diplomatskega in političnega vrha za Alojza Urana dokaj logična, čeravno ne tudi popolnoma pričakovana. Izrekli so se za tako vlogo Cerkve, ki naj prispeva k spravnim vetrovom, skoraj gotovo pa je h končni odločitvi precej pripomoglo tudi novo razmerje sil v Sloveniji. Najprej po junijskih evropskih volitvah, še posebej pa po oktobrskih parlamentarnih volitvah.

Tam sem najprej delal kot strežnik pri zidarjih in bil kot "novopečenec" neprestano deležen zmerjanja in zbadanja, kako smo Slovenci sterilni in neznani. "Le enega imenuj, ki je res dosegel nekaj izjemnega!"

Takoj sem omenil misijonarja in škofa Barago, ki je bil tudi odličen lingvist (njegov indijianski slovar je še danes v rabi kot najboljši), a so se mi le smejali, češ da je povsem neznan.

Kaj pa takratni guverner države Ohio Frank J. Lausche, ki je rad omenjal svoje slovenske starše? "On je rojen v Ameriki," so kričali.

Tako sem po trden delu začel ob večerih zahajati v knjižnice. Skušal sem najti kakšne prepričljive podatke o uspešnih Slovencih, vendar nisem našel domala ničesar. Zasledil pa knjige, kot je Duncanovo Immigration and Assimilation, kjer je pisalo, da Slovenci sploh nimamo svojega knjižnega jezika, da moramo študirati v tujih jezikih in da je 86 odstotkov Slovencev nepismenih.

Pri tem mi je zavrela kri in sem pisal založbi, da to ne drži. Založnik mi je odgovoril, da ne more pomagati in da bodo podatke spremenili, če bodo knjigo kdaj ponatisnili.

Vse take in podobne izkušnje so me vzpodbudile, da sem začel takoj sistematično raziskovati

slovenske uspehe v Ameriki in po vsem svetu. Imel sem ničkoliko pogovorov, pregledoval sezname znanstvenikov, industrialcev itd. in pisal ljudem s slovensko zvenečimi priimki, ali so slovenskega rodu, in jih v tem primeru prosil za podatke in slike.

Prenekateri konec tedna sem natipkal od 20 do 40 ali več pisem pa vedno prosil še za naslove, napotke, časopisne izrezke in kopije. Pregledoval sem tujo literaturo, in če sem tu in tam le našel kak dober citat o Sloveniji, sem ga objavil pod naslovom "This is Slovenija" najprej v Akademiku in listu Slovenska država, pozneje pa še v knjigi This is Slovenia, ki so jo leta 1958 izdali v Torontu, Kanada.

Čeprav je bilo zaradi bližajoče se 40. obletnice osvoboditve izpod Avstrije, službe, študija drugega dela vedno premalo časa za pisanje osrednjega besedila, so že o tej knjigi, ki sta jo uredila dr. Rudolf Čuješ in Vlado Mauko, in o Slovencih prav ugodno pisali številni kanadski in ameriški listi s skupno naklado več milijonov izvodov.

Na podlagi gradiva, ki ste ga zbrali, ste napisali rokopis za knjigo iš as Slovenski Američanija v o 186 Velikem Clevelandu, divogoin izvirniku Slovenian Americans in Greater Cleveland. No, potem pa se je začelo zapletati.

To je bil moj najbolj boleči projekt. Najprej sem napisal krajši rokopis za knjigo, ki bi skupaj z nekaj slikami obsegala okoli 250 strani, kar sem nameraval izdati do božiča 1973. Rokopis sem razmnožil in 30 kopij poslal osebam, ki naj bi izrazile svoja mnenja, kritiko in morebitne doda-

Dobival sem zelo spodbudne odmeve, vključno enega s strani takrat kar res uglednega predsednika clevelandske univerze dr. Enarsona, ki mi je celo sam od sebe poslal tale citat za ovitek:

"Dr. Gobec nam pomaga k tistemu globljemu razumevanju, ki ga naša razklana družba tako zelo potrebuje."

Medtem ko je nekaj ljudi zlorabilo moje zaupanje in poslano gradivo, me je večina spodbujala in želela, naj bi rokopis še razširil. Ko sem odgovarjal, da bi ne bilo denarja za zajetnejšo knjigo, mi je med drugimi slovenski milijonar John Drenik dajal pogum. "Ne skrbi, Edi! Ti napravi vse, kar moreš, deficit bom pa v celoti plačal jaz!"

Takrat je začela tudi ameriška vlada obljubljati podpore za izseljenske študije in nove raziskovalne ustanove, fundacije in družbe so po besedah Paula Deaca iz Washingtona rasle kot gobe po dežju in skušale prevzeti državna in druga sredstva, včasih celo s podkupovanjem. Tudi špekulantov, šarlatanov in plagiatorjev ni manjkalo in Slovenci žal nismo bili izjema.

Čez noč je bilo polno strokovnjakov, četudi popolnih novincev na teh področjih, ki so začeli s polno paro spletkariti proti nam, nam podtikati svoje grehe, obljubljati podpore na vse strani in s pomočjo politikov pobirati in "koordinirati" visoke zneske državnih in drugih podpor.

Kot da bi se vse zaklelo, je prav takrat umrl naš najobetavnejši podpornik John Drenik; tekmeci so dosegli močno propagando zase in cenzuro za nas in v tisti brezupni situaciji sem tiskarni okrog plačal enajst tisoč dolarjev za do takrat opravljeno delo in ustavil tisk, saj smo

imeli še dolg na hiši in tri majhne otroke in bi lahko izgubili še dom.

Kdor bi želel, si lahko po več kot treh desetletjih še danes pri nas ogleda orumenele krtačne odtise za knjigo o clevelandskih Slovencih, ki bi bila verjetno najzajetnejša in ponosna študija o kaki izseljenski naselbini v Ameriki. Pokažemo pa lahko tudi kak dobeseden citat iz naših neobjavljenih rokopisov, seveda brez navedbe vira plagiat ali tatvino torej!

Kako pa je prišlo do ustanovitve Slovenskega raziskovalnega centra (Slovenian Research Center of America, Inc. -SRCA? Je to vaša zamisel?

Do ustanovitve SRCA je prišlo postopoma. Zbiral sem gradivo, citate, spraševal itd. Pregledal sem več kot tisoč univerzitetnih katalogov in izpisoval in skušal preveriti slovensko zveneča imena. Zanimivo je, da sem recimo našel pogost priimek Koren, vendar ni šlo za Slovence, ampak Norvežane, kar kaže, kako zelo je treba biti previden.

Našel sem Slovenca na Harvardski Stareta univerzi, ki je imel tri doktorate in bil eden največjih strokovnjakov za prehrano v ZDA in svetu. Njegov stari oče, ki je bil tovarnar, je ugotovil, da so prišli Stareti že leta 1790 v Ameriko, in našel zabeleženo, da so doma iz Kranjske.

To naše delo je očaralo prenekaterega rodoljuba (tudi v Sloveniji, na primer, inž. Khama, dr. Savnika, dr. Trstenjaka, ki o njem piše tudi v eni svojih knjig itd.).

Že takoj v začetku se nam je pridružilo nekaj sodelavcev, v nekaj letih pa smo pod imenom Slovenskega raziskovalnega centra v Ameriki združevali presenetljivo široko omrežje sodelavcev po skoraj vsem svetu, ustanovili še odbor zaupnikov in si zagotovili državno priznanje neprofitne raziskovalne in vzgojne usta-

Vse delo sloni na idealizmu. Nihče ni zanj plačan in sam sem skozi leta odštel več kot 40 tisoč dolariev za neizbežne stroške iz svojega ne prav bogatega profesorskega žepa. Boga hvalim

AD) popoldne srečati na ljubljanskem okrožnem sodišču, vendar sta se postopku izognila z zunajsodno poravnavo. Njeno besedilo bo na Lajovčeve stroške objavljeno v Delu in Magu, po objavi pa bo Roter zasebno tožbo umaknil.

Dušan S. Lajovic je dvignil veliko prahu z internetno objavo zaupnih udbovskih seznamov in nato še z izdajo knjige z naslovom Med svobodo in rdečo zvezdo. Veliko je nastopal tudi v medijih in Zdenko Roter je zaradi dveh žaljivih obdolžitev zoper njega vložil zasebno tožbo.

Novinar Rok Praprotnik je 19. aprila lani v Delu objavil pogovor z Lajovcem v prispevku z naslovom Moj namen je razkriti barabije komunistov. V pogovoru so bile med drugim zapisane Lajovčeve besede: "Oznovec Zdenko Roter je dvakrat zaprl mojega očeta in mamo."

Zasebni tožilec je v tožbi zapisal, da gre za nedopusten poseg v njegovo osebno integriteto in neresnična trditev škoduje njegovi časti in dobremu imenu.



Enak očitek velja za navedbo v pogovoru novinarja Silvestra Šurle 2 Lajovcem, objavljenem 23. aprila lani v tedniku Mag. V prispevku Vrnitev udbe so bile zapisane Lajovčeve besede o zasebnem tožilcu:

"Med drugim je navedeno, da je svetovalec Milana Kučana - kako se že piše - Zdenko Roter leta 1950 na Bledu ubil fanta. Tekel je in ga ustrelil. Piše, da zaradi ljubosumnosti. Zaradi tega je bil obsojen, mislim. da ni dobil niti tri me sece, ampak samo pogoj no."

Na ljubljanskem sodišču so morali z obravna vo počakati do jeseni, saj je Lajovic svojemu odve^t niku Jožetu Hriberniku sporočil, da bo iz Avstra lije prišel na obisk v do movino konec septembra

Ko je že kazalo, da bo sodišče obravnavalo zasebno tožbo, pa je Lajovcu in Roterju, slednje ga sta zastopala odvetni ka mag. Emil Zakonjšek in Peter Toš, uspelo re šiti spor po mirni poti.

V besedilu poravnave je Lajovic izjavil, da spor na trditev, ki je bila ^{ob} javljena v Delu, in sicer, da je Roter zaprl njegove starše, ne drži. Prav ta ko je zatrdil, da ne drži trditev, ki je bila objav ljena v *Magu*, saj, koli^{kol} ve, Roter na Bledu n ubil fanta.

Spomenik in opomnik

Teharje – V nedeljo, 10. oktobra, je bil na Teharjah, na kraju povojnega komunističnega taborišča, blagoslov Spominskega parka Teharje, ki ga je država gradila več kot deset let.

Ob navzočnosti častne straže slovenske vojske je predsednik državnega zbora Feri Horvat v kripti osrednjega spomenika ob sarkofag položil venec.

Dejal je, da mu je v posebno čast, da je v imenu Republike Slovenije odprl spomenik žrtvam pomorov zajetih domobrancev in civilistov, in nadaljeval:

"Zakrivila jih je takratna država takoj po koncu
druge svetovne vojne. Nobena stvar na svetu sicer
ne more odtehtati smrti,
nasilne, krute in krivične
toliko manj. S tem spomenikom se naša država,
Republika Slovenija, želi
simbolično oddolžiti tem
žrtvam in svojcem za njihovo trpljenje.

Z obžalovanjem povojnih pomorov, s sočutjem do svojcev njihovih žrtev in v upanju, da bomo zmogli preseči travme preteklosti, odpiram ta spomenik in ga predajam naši skupnosti v izpolnjevanje njegovega namena: naj bo ta simbol spomenik za nazaj in opomnik za naprej! Da bi nam pomagal premagovati žalost in zamere in krepiti duhovno moč za spravo med nami!"

Peter Kovačič Peršin, predsednik vladne komisije za ureditev grobišč, je pojasnil, da "Spominski park Teharje stoji na osrednjem delu povojnega taborišča Teharje, iz katerega so odvažali v smrt v domovino vrnjene domobrance in civile, mnogi pa so bili pomorjeni že tu.

Občina Celja je že pred desetletjem sprejela sklep, da se zato prav na tem kraju postavi osrednji spomenik slovenžrtvam povojnih množičnih pomorov. Za izgradnjo spomenika, ki je najmogočnejši tovrstni spomenik v naši državi, se je nato obvezala Vlada RS in zanj zadolžila komisijo za ureditev grobišč. Komisija v sedanji sestavi je prevzela skrb za dokončanje projekta pred dobrimi tremi leti in ga uspela s pomočjo ministrstva za delo dokončati to jesen."

Poudaril je, da ta osrednji spomenik žrtvam vojne in revolucije vrača na simbolni način ime in človeško dostojanstvo vsem brezimnim in zamolčanim žrtvam, izpolnjuje pa tudi naš civilizacijski dolg, s čimer slovenski narod zopet vstopa v krog civiliziranih in z lastno zgodovino pomirjenih evropskih narodov. Hkrati bo stalen opomin, da bomo kot narod poslej živeli med seboj v strpnosti in sožitju kljub razumljivim razlikam, ki jih ustvarjajo različni nazori.

Spominski park je blagoslovil mariborski škof dr. Franc Kramberger, ki je nato ob somaševanju sedmih duhovnikov daroval mašo. V pridigi je dejal, da "je naša krajevna Cerkev in lahko rečem vsa Cerkev na Slovenskem zbrana na kraju, o katerem se ni smelo govoriti - na kraju, kamor nismo smeli priti zaradi skrivnosti, ki jo zakriva zemlja, odpadni material in jo raztaplja voda teharskega jezera.

Smo pri njih, ki jih nismo smeli imenovati in obiskati; smo na slovenski – štajerski Kalvariji, kjer se je pred 59 leti uresničil veliki petek za tisoče in desettisoče iz našega naroda."

Poudaril je, da "upravičeno stoji na tej Kalvariji križ, znamenje, ki nakazuje dve smeri: vodoravno, ki nam veleva, da v to spominsko slavje vključimo vse vojne in povojne žrtve na Teharjah in sploh na Stajerskem; - vertikalna ali navpična smer pa nam naroča, da s tem spominskim slavjem pridružimo njihovo daritev sveti daritvi zanje, za nas, za ves slovenski narod."

Na slovesnosti, ki jo je zaznamoval močan dež in odsotnost Nove slovenske zaveze, je nastopil tudi orkester slovenske policije, pel pa je združeni celjski dekanijski pevski zbor.
