- PREGLED NAJAVAŽNEJŠIH DOGODKOV -

Porota obsodila enajst Palestincev zaradi ugrabitev ladje Achille Lauro in umora ameriškega potnika Leona Klinghofferja

GENOVA, Ita. — Včeraj je porota, ki so jo sestavili dva sodnika in šest navadnih državljanov, obsodila enajst Palestincev, ker so sodelovali v ugrabitvi potniške ladje Achille Lauro in umoru potnika Leona Klinghofferja. Širje drugi obtoženci so bili oproščeni. Med obsojenimi je tudi vodilni član PLO Mohammed Abbas, ki so ga skupaj z nekaterimi drugimi sodili v odsotnosti. Abbas je sicer bil nekaj časa v italijanskih rokah, a so ga izpustili in je izginil ob aktivni pomoči jugoslovanskih oblasti. Od vseh 15 obtožencev, jih je le pet v priporo.

Abbas in pet svojih pajdašev so bili obsojeni na dosmrtno ječo, 23-letni terorist, ki je dejansko ustrelil 69 let starega, na vozičku priklenjenega Klinghofferja, pa je dobil le 30 let v ječi. Hčerki Klinghofferja sta dejali v New Yorku, da sta razočarani nad milostjo izrečene kazni, italijanski tožilec pa je rekel, da se bo obrnil na prizivno sodišče in prosil za zvišanje kazni. Predstavnik State Departmenta je dejal v Washingtonu, da se bodo ZDA prizadevale za izročitev Abbasa in drugih obsojencev Italiji. Vsi se menda nahajajo v raznih sredozemskih državah, ki so PLO naklonjene in na izročitev ne bodo pristale.

**Izraelci preprečili teroristični napad —
Bojna letala bombardirala palestinska
oporišča v južnem Libanonu**

JERUZALEM, Izr. — Včeraj so izraelska letala prvič v zadnjem letu bombardirala oporišča palestinskih gverilcev v južnem Libanonu. V napadih je bilo ubitih najmanj deset oseb. Izraelska akcija je bila maščevanje za neuspehl poskus terorističnega napada skupine palestinskih gverilcev. Izraelci so Palestince pravočasno odkrili, sledil je silovit napad, v katerem so bili ubiti vsi širje Palestinci, padla pa sta dva izraelska vojaka, devet jih je bilo ranjenih.

Karte in dokumenti, ki so jih imeli s seboj gverilci, kažejo, trdi uradno izraelsko poročilo, da so nameravali napasti neko civilno naselje v severnem delu države.

**Nesoglasja med Reaganovimi svetovalci
glede pogajanj s Sovjetsko zvezo
povzročajo težave za predsednika**

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Splošno je znano, da je v Reaganovi administraciji precej nesoglasja glede stališča do pogajanj s Sovjetsko zvezo o omejevanju oborožitvene tekme. Na eni strani je obrambni tajnik Caspar W. Weinberger in nekaj vplivnih članov Reaganevega štaba v Beli hiši, na drugi pa je državni sekretar George Shultz, ki pa tudi lahko računa na podporo nekaj vplivnih Reaganych svetovalcev v Beli hiši. Spor je baje tako globok, da bo lahko napravil konec le Reagan, ki pa se še ni opredelil. Nesoglasje pa povzroča silne težave v izoblikovanju ameriškega stališča do ZSSR.

Weinberger je silno skeptičen do Sovjetov in zagovarja trdo roko. Tako je obrambni sekretar proti sovjetskemu predlogu, naj bi se predstavniki obeh velesil sestali 22. julija v Ženevi in se pogovorili o SALT II pogodbji iz leta 1979. Shultz pa meni, da bi bilo srečanje koristno, ker bi lahko vodilo do še drugih in morda celo do napredovanja v ameriško-sovjetskih pogajanjih. Reagan je sicer zelo nezaupen do ZSSR, želi pa doseči sporazum o omejevanju oboroževalne tekme med ZDA in ZSSR.

Reagan zagovarja znižanje davkov na dohodke posameznikov — Obrestne mere zopet znižane — Cena nafte zopet padla

DOTHAN, Ala. — Včeraj je predsednik Reagan obiskal to mesto in izrazil svojo podporo za reformo davčnega sistema ZDA. Predstavniki obeh domov zveznega kongresa sedaj skušajo izoblikovati zakonski osnutek, ki bi ga naj po končni odobritvi predstavnškega doma in senata Reagan podpisal ozroma potrdil. Med pogajalci se pa pojavljajo razna trenja in zato je Reagan javno apeliral, naj ne bodo posamezniki obdavčeni za več kot 27 odstotkov svojega dohodka. Pod obstoječim davčnim sistemom, je lahko posameznik obdavčen do 49% svojega dohodka.

V Kongresu menijo, da bodo lahko poslali zakon o spremenjenem davčnem sistemu predsedniku najkasneje do 1. septembra, torej do Delavskega dne praznika.

Včeraj je svet guvernerjev centralne banke oz. Federal Reserve znižal obrestno mero od 6.5 na 6%. Zadnjič je bila ta mera tako nizka proti koncu 1977. leta. Do včerajšnjega ukrepa je prišlo zaradi ugotovitve, da ameriško gospodarstvo kaže prve znake začrtanja. Nižja obrestna mera naj bi vodila do oživitve gospodarske aktivnosti.

Na mednarodnem naftnih trgih je cena nafte zopet padla in sicer za nekatere sorte kar na 11 dolarjev za sod. Nekateri poznavalci naftnega trga menijo, da bo cena lahko padla celo na 8 dolarjev za sod. Na nedavnem sestanku na Brionih v SFRJ, naftni ministri OPEC držav niso dosegli sporazuma glede cene nafte ali količine tega »črnega zlata«, ki jo bodo pošiljali na trg.

- Kratke vesti -

RIM, Ita. — **Predsednik države Francesco Cossiga** je prosil 67-letnega Giulia Andreottija, naj sestavi 45. vlado v povojni zgodovini Italije. Andreottija, ki je že vodil pet italijanskih vlad, je član krščansko demokratske stranke. Prejšnja vlada Bettina Craxija je padla, ker sta se sprli krščansko demokratski in socialistični stranki.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — **Predstavniki ZDA in Kube** niso uspeli v poskusu obnovitve sporazuma iz leta 1984, po katerem je Kuba pristala na vrnitev nekaj kriminalcev in duševno zaostalih oseb, ki jim je bila dovolila odhod v ZDA pred leti. Kubanci so sporazum razveljavili, ki je začel oddajati Radio Marti, radijska postaja v španskem jeziku, ki jo financira ameriška vlada.

HANOI, Vi. — Umrl je 79 let stari Le Duan, voditelj Vietnamita od leta 1969, ko je umrl Ho Či Minh. Na krmilo vietnamske države bodo sedaj baje prišli mlajši ljudje.

MANILA, Fi. — **Filipinska predsednica Corazon Aquino** namerava obiskati ZDA septembra letos. Aquinova in njen pokojni mož sta živelna v ZDA nekaj let kot politična begunca.

MADRID, Špa. — **V teku so pogajanja** med Španijo in ZDA o novi pogodbi, ki bo določala število ameriških vojakov, nastanjenih na ameriških NATO oporiščih v tej državi. Španska vlada želi, da bi se število teh vojakov — sedaj jih je kakih 12.500 — znižalo. Kot kaže, pogajanja napredujejo.

MANGA, Nik. — **Uradno sporočilo obrambnega ministrstva** trdi, da so sandinistične sile v tem tednu ubile 41 »contras«, 10 jih pa ranile. O sandinističnih izgubah ni bilo nič sporočenega.

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Kaj se dogaja na Koroškem

Koroški demokratično čuteči Slovenci so po zadnji vojni ustanovili Narodni svet koroških Slovencev (NSKS), ki nekako odgovarja naši Slovenski skupnosti; v njem se zbirajo Korošci, ki naj bi hodili v politiki lastno pot neodvisno od zunanjih direktiv.

Letos je 23. februarja imel NSKS svoj občni zbor. Politično poročilo je imel dr. Matevž Grilc, predsednik NSKS. V svojem poročilu je ostro napadel Celovško Mohorjevo družbo ter revijo Celovški zvon in pok. škofa Rožmana. Tako poroča o tem kongresu revija U Boot - Podmornica. Ista revija takoj nato pojasnjuje, kakšni so ti »interesi«, ko zapiše: »Vse slovenske organizacije na Koroškem so odvisne od jugoslovanske podpore. Brez te ne bi bila možna niti politika samostojnih volilnih nastopov, niti obširno kulturno sodelovanje...«

V glasbenih in baletnih šolah je na tisoče mladih, sanjočih obrazov, ki vadijo, trenirajo in pogosto s pomočjo







Exposing the Expo

Madeline and I spent 12 the most exciting days of our lives when we ventured to the Canadian Northwest to see Expo 86 and travel through the Canadian Rockies.

Our 12 day vacation began on Friday, June 20 with a flight to Seattle and ended at the World's Largest Indoor Shopping Mall in Edmondton, Alberta.

The one thing most prevalent throughout the trip was the friendliness of the people. For example, after waiting in line to see a display a country had to offer at the Expo, each guest was greeted with a friendly "hello," and, "thanks for coming to visit." Service personnel in restaurants, hotels, shops, etc. were extremely courteous, something that is sadly lacking in most of the United States.

The flights and tour arrangements were by Kollander World Travel on E. 185 St. in Cleveland. Our trip throughout Canada was handled by Cooke's of Canada.

We left Cleveland at 3 p.m. on Friday, June 20 and landed in Seattle about 6:30 p.m. with a stopover in Chicago. We gained three hours because of traveling through time zones. Immediately we arranged our own tour of Seattle and saw the Space Needle, Kingdome where the baseball and football teams play, plus the fascinating waterfront area where one can stroll around

and taste the fish catches of the day at dozens of seaside restaurants.

Early the next morning the haze cleared for a while and we saw Mt. Ranier. We left at 11:30 a.m. for a short flight to Vancouver, British Columbia where the last exposition of this century was being held.

Going through customs the officer asked us how long we would be at Expo 86. We told him three days. He said you'll need it plus comfortable walking shoes. He was right on both counts.

Our hotel was called Inn at False Creek. It was located perfectly for the Expo, only four half blocks walk to the West Gate. The hotel's food was superior and our room gave a perfect view of most of the Expo activities without the distraction of the noise.

We immediately began touring the Expo grounds and kept going until it closed at 10 p.m. At the end of the day our feet were very tired. The event is similar to Epcot Center in Disneyworld, Florida where each country has a building and inside they display items which may be of interest to others. Most of the countries also had movies showing their points of interest.

And most of the movies were very unusual being in 3-D or Circle-Vision where just seeing the film is an adventure. Particularly interesting was the movie about the Province of Ontario where 800 persons sit in a theater and wear 3-D

glasses and you see ducks flying around and you think they're right in front of you and the audience instinctively reaches out to grab one of the birds as they fly by. It's terrific.

To get to Canada Place, one gets on a train in the Expo area and travels to another section of Vancouver where buildings in the shape of ships house more exhibits and dances and live programs about Canada. There are also 3-D films there where someone seems to drop an egg on each person's head. Ships traveling to Alaska and the Caribbean were tied up next door and we could watch them getting underway.

The food at the Expo was very good and you could eat at various nationality restaurants. Zorba the Greek was particularly good and they featured a belly dancer for entertainment.

The theme of Expo 86 is Communication and Motion. The Telecommunications movie is really terrific with only about a 15 minute wait. You feel you are right in the picture taking part in the action. The Ontario Pavilion line took an hour and a half of our time. Australia had strictly a travel film to get you to visit Australia next year when they defend their U.S. Sailing cup which was won by them and taken away from the United States for the first time in 130 years. After they tell you about it for 130 times you get tired of hearing it. They like to say G'day. They mentioned, however, that Yugoslavs migrated there and became a part of the country. Unfortunately, they didn't have any seats in their three showrooms which had to be visited one at a time. Guests were asked to

sit on the floor. Most of the visitors were very upset about that, particularly those who couldn't bend down very easily.

The U.S. exhibit showed one-fourth, one-eighth, and so on examples of space satellites so after a while you didn't know what a real one might look like. The Soviet Union on the other hand had the actual satellite there to be examined at leisure. It was the one which went into Halley's Comet. Outside their pavilion they had an actual space lab which visitors could climb into and look around. Very interesting.

There is so much walking, the venture would be difficult for children. The scenery in the background is magnificent with all the mountains in their majestic splendor.

Saw the Yugoslavia exhibit. They spelled it Yougoslav there probably for phonetic purposes. The country had a restaurant on the premises, but we didn't see anyone eating there. The prices seemed terribly high. The domestic beer, for example was double the Canadian price. The main part of their exhibit was the Yugo car. You can see the car in Cleveland or elsewhere. It was disappointing.

There is plenty of transportation available with boat rides, gondolas, trains, rapids, sky rides, and some sort of half box, half circle which really moved along and was comfortable.

Customers at the Expo pay one price \$20 a day, or \$45 for a three day pass which everyone seemed to do. When you say you're from the Greater Cleveland area, it blows most people's minds as it seems most Expo-goers have driven up from California,

Washington State, or Oregon, or other parts of Canada.

On Sunday we took a tour of Vancouver and saw the beauty of Stanley Park and totem poles which they say are native to British Columbia. Vancouver also boasts the second largest Chinatown (next to San Francisco) in America.

We then spent another 10 hours at the Expo. With the total of 18 hours there we didn't see all of it.

On Monday most people on our tour opted to spend their final day again at the Expo. They hadn't arrived in Vancouver until later Saturday afternoon or early evening and consequently had only spent a few hours at the Expo that first day and didn't want to miss anything.

Madeline and I took a tour to the city of Victoria on Vancouver Island. The ferry ride across takes an hour and a half. About 500 buses and cars get on the boat but all passengers must get off and sit on the upper decks of the boat for a very pleasant trip.

We stopped at Butchart Gardens for a few hours and marveled at the beautiful flowers and landscaping. The place had been a quarry where the owner of the Portland Cement Company had dug out the gypsum. His wife then made the empty spot into the garden. Although there were a large number of cement companies at the time, Butchart was the first to use paper bags to transport his cement. Prior to that it was hauled in expensive wood boxes.

In the summer they hire a lot of college kids to work there, but there was one elder gentleman wearing white gloves and sunglasses directing parking traffic. The bus driver said he was the world's highest paid parking lot attendant. He was the owner. Victoria, the capitol of British Columbia is very picturesque. Two or three days there would have been preferable.


While we were in Victoria, Mary Pangonis and Marge Maslar of Cleveland began a trip to the Expo with the Milan Racanovic tour. They arrived in Vancouver that Monday evening. Madeline and I were returning from Victoria around 8:30 p.m. and we asked the tour guide to let us off at the hotel where our two friends were staying. We walked into the lobby and there they were. We all went up to their room and gabbed until the wee hours of the morning.

The next day, luggage was out at 7 p.m. and we began our trip through the Canadian Rockies.

The scenery was so beautiful that the only way to describe it is to say, "go and see it and judge for yourself." It is absolutely breathtaking.

That Tuesday we stayed at one of the most unusual places in the continent. It was called Three Valley Gap Hotel. Three mountains form the background with a lake in the middle that comes right on the

hotel property. It was almost as beautiful as Lake Louise.

The owner and his family brought to his property wooden buildings that were standing at the turn of the century in various local spots. He restored them and made it into a ghost town which we walked through. In the middle was a chuck wagon where steaks were fried and we ate dinner in the restored hotel. Later we all sauntered into the saloon for some revelry.

The next morning we stopped at the Revelstoke Dam where water power is harnessed and made into electricity which is fed into a distribution station and sent to Canada and the U.S. It seems an easier and safer way to do it rather than nuclear power and less expensive. Very enlightening tour.

The next day we saw the Great Divide where water comes down the mountains and in the middle it breaks in two parts, one going to the Pacific and the other east to the Hudson Bay and further east. The stream is only about three feet wide.

Glacier National Park was breathtaking with the high mountains and we could see the snow on top.

We came to a halt at the city of Banff in Banff National Park. The city is laid out in one long strip with shops and

restaurants galore. We saw some beautiful furs and plenty of jade.

The next day we toured the area on our motor coach. Those of us who felt a little brave took a four-passenger gondola ride to near the top of Sulphur Mountain. Thrilling experience.

Five of us ventured further on and climbed to the very top of Sulphur Mountain, about 9,000 feet. There's nothing up there but rocks and wind. We ended up climbing on our hands and knees to reach the summit.

The most enchanting part of our trip was at Lake Louise. It is so picturesque that we just sat there for a long while taking in the beauty of the mountains and the peaceful lake. It is one spot everyone should see. Absolutely one of the most breathtaking spots in the world.

Our second last day of the tour was to the city of Jasper in the western part of Alberta. There is a deep gorge nearby made by rushing water that is awesome to see.

Prior to that we stopped at the Columbia Icefield. We took a snowmobile ride on the Athabasca Glacier and walked on the 1,000 feet deep ice field which is left over from the last great ice period which covered most of Canada. It is like walking on slush with rivers of

water pouring all around. The ice is healthy to eat and we helped ourselves. Madeline brought some ice back and passed it out to the passengers who had stayed behind because of the hazard of traversing the ruts and slippery ice. That ice took hours to melt it was so cold.

The ice is formed when it snows and snows and when 30 feet of snow piles up the pressure of the snow on itself forms an ice field. It was a most unusual experience to be walking on all this snow in the middle of summer.

The last day of the regular tour took us to Edmonton, the capital of Alberta. We toured the city and state house. We saw hockey super star Wayne Gretzky's apartment where he owns the top two floors.

Everyone was excited to visit the largest indoor shopping mall in the world, West Edmonton Mall. Inside is the world's largest indoor amusement park with rides galore. The Ice Palace is a full size skating rink where the Edmonton Oilers (National Hockey League team) practice on occasion on Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

There are four actual mini-submarines which takes passenger for rides under the water. They really go down into the water, run around a track in the water, and passengers see live sharks, porpoises, an exact replica of the Santa Maria (Columbus' ship), and other under-sea sights. The Canadian navy has three mini-subs, so the mall has one more.

There is miniature golf, and a swimming pool so large, they have sand on the shallow end with wave makers so it gives the effect of swimming in the ocean. There are 22 waterslides into the pool. There were about 2,000 persons in it and you could actually swim around, it is so large. The mall also has 14 movie shows. Although the stores close at 9 p.m. the mall is open until at least 2 a.m. for those who go night clubbing at the many restaurants there such as on Bourbon Street. Sherlock Holmes is an English pub with meals and drinks that might be found in Great Britain.

tain. There is no way in the world that you don't think you are actually in New Orleans while walking on Bourbon Street. It is amazing to come to the end of the street and realize you are still in a shopping mall.

If you feel like shopping, there are 800 retail stores. Of that number we recognized only four that you might see in the States.

There are so many restaurants that it's unbelievable. We ate lunch at the longest French Restaurant in the world. In three full days, a person may see most of the stores. In the fall a hotel will open on the premises with 360 "fantasy" rooms such as Roman, Hawaiian, etc. Each floor will capture the atmosphere and charm of a different theme with decor and music.

The Mall must be seen to be believed. It's fantastic. One of the wonders of the world. We spent three days there.

Most of the areas we traveled during our trek through Western Canada was discovered during the gold rush days. There is still gold in the hills and one can pan for gold today and take about \$35 worth a day out of the streams right in the city such as Edmonton. Most of the early gold-seekers walked 500 to a thousand miles to get there. The Canadian Railroad came in next to transport the prospectors and supplies. They bought up the choice lands and put their hotels there. The railroad hotels are the best, most beautiful and charming. The entire trip was educational and fascinating. There wasn't much time to rest. If you did, you missed something spectacular. We highly recommend visiting British Columbia and Alberta and if your feet are in good shape, Expo 86. The Expo closes in October. We were lucky because our motor coach group was very compatible with no whiners. Seventy-five percent were teachers ranging from recent college grads up to a few with doctor's degrees. Everyone was excited being a part of an overwhelming experience.

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Recipes

CRISPY CHICKEN STIR-FRY

1 cup Bisquick baking mix
1/2 tsp. pepper
2 cups diced uncooked chicken breast
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1/4 cup vegetable oil
3 medium carrots, cut diagonally into 1/2" pieces
1 green pepper, cut into strips
1 small onion, cut into thin slices and separated into rings
1 can (20 oz.) pineapple chunks, drained

Mix Bisquick and pepper in large plastic bag. Stir chicken into eggs; remove chicken with slotted spoon and place in bag with baking mix. Shake bag until chicken is coated; remove chicken from bag.

Heat 1 tbsp. of the oil in 10" skillet over medium-high heat until hot. Stir-fry carrots 2 minutes; add green pepper. Stir-fry 2 minutes. Remove from skillet; keep warm. Add remaining oil to skillet; heat until hot.

Stir-fry chicken until golden brown; add carrots, green pepper and onion. Stir-fry until warm, about 2 minutes; stir in pineapple. 6 to 8 servings. Five minutes to prepare.

SWEET AND SOUR CUCUMBERS

3 large cucumbers (about 2 pounds)
1/3 cup water
1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
2 tablespoons tarragon vinegar
4 teaspoons sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper

ABOUT 25 MINUTES BEFORE SERVING

With vegetable peeler, peel cucumbers, leaving 1/2-inch-

wide strips of green peel for attractive color. Cut cucumbers crosswise into 1/2-inch-thick slices; set aside.

In 3-quart saucepan, mix water and remaining ingredients. Add cucumbers; over high heat, heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer 10 minutes or until cucumbers are tender and sauce is slightly thickened, stirring mixture occasionally. Makes 4 accompaniment servings.

Skillet Chicken Mozzarella

1 medium green pepper
1 small onion
2 medium zucchini (1 pound)
2 large chicken breasts, boned and skinned
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons salad oil
3/4 15-ounce jar spaghetti sauce (1 cup)
1/2 teaspoon sugar
1/2 8-ounce package mozzarella cheese, sliced

1. Cut green pepper into bite-sized pieces. Slice onion. Cut each zucchini lengthwise into quarters; cut each quarter into 3/4 inch chunks. Set vegetables aside.

2. Cut each chicken breast in half. With meat mallet or dull edge of French knife, pound each chicken-breast half to 1/4-inch thickness. On waxed paper, combine flour, salt, and pepper; coat chicken pieces with flour mixture.

3. In 10-inch skillet over medium-high heat, in hot salad oil, cook chicken pieces until browned on both sides. Remove chicken to plate. In drippings remaining in skillet over medium heat, cook onion and green pepper until tender-crisp, stirring frequently.

4. Return chicken to skillet; add spaghetti sauce, sugar, and zucchini; over high heat, heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer 15 minutes or until chicken and vegetables are fork-tender. Top chicken breast with mozzarella cheese and simmer until cheese is melted, about 2 minutes. Makes 4 servings. 470 calories per serving.

OVEN CHICKEN PARMIGIANA

Heat oven to 350°.
3/4 cup Bisquick baking mix
1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1 tsp. paprika
2 1/2 to 3 1/2 lb. broiler-fryer chicken, cut up
1 can (5 oz.) evaporated milk
1/4 cup margarine or butter, melted

Mix Bisquick, cheese and paprika

Dip chicken into evaporated milk; coat with cheese mixture. Place skin sides up in ungreased rectangular pan, 13x9x2"; drizzle with margarine.

Bake until done, about 1 hour. Six servings. Takes 10 minutes to prepare.

NUTTY APRICOT OAT BREAD

1/2 cup oats, uncooked
1 cup whole-wheat flour
1/2 cup dried apricots, cut into fourths
1/4 cup wheat germ
1/4 cup almonds, chopped
2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup skim milk

1/2 cup honey
1/4 cup salad oil
3/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 egg, beaten slightly

Early in day or day ahead:

- Preheat oven to 350°F. Grease and lightly flour 8 1/2" by 4 1/2" loaf pan. In blender at low speed, blend oats to coarse flour, stopping blender occasionally to stir oats.

- In large bowl, mix oats and next 8 ingredients.

- In small bowl, mix milk and next 4 ingredients. Stir into flour mixture just until flour is moistened. Pour batter into pan. Bake 45 to 50 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack 10 minutes; remove from pan and cool completely on rack. Makes 1 loaf or 12 servings. About 190 calories per serving.

Note: When used in baking, you can substitute up to 1/3 of the all-purpose flour called for with oat flour without substantially changing the texture.

GRILLED LAMB RIBS WITH APRICOT GLAZE

4 pounds lamb riblets (breast of lamb)

1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 jars (10 oz. each) apricot preserves
5 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
1 1/2 teaspoons curry powder

Trim lamb breasts well, removing almost all fat on top. Season ribs with salt and pepper. Grill over medium coals, turning often, about 20 minutes.

Meanwhile, in small saucepan combine remaining ingredients and keep warm at edge of grill. Baste lamb with glaze during last 10 minutes of cooking. Serve remaining glaze as a sauce. Makes 4 to 6 servings, 610 calories each per four.

Spoon over filling, freeze 1 hour or chill in refrigerator 3 hours before serving. Garnish with blueberries and mint leaves, if desired.

On the road with Eleanor

Scenery is now beginning to look like southern Ohio. Highest mountain in England is 3,000 feet elevation. In the distance, we see an outline of a white horse on the hill. Many such outlines are dug out of the soil in this area. Probably had some religious meaning a long time ago. Hedge alongside of road is trimmed in the shape of a battle cruiser—it is an eye catcher. Kale and potato crops are now appearing.

We are passing loads of sheep farms with many ewes hovering near their mothers. The guide points out to us a Victorian statue commemorating Queen Victoria's daughter's wedding to the Prince of Germany which replaces a cross that had stood there originally. It is here that the largest stock auction in England takes place. Farmers had to have extra horses to help pull heavy loads up the hill. Not very far is the town of Kitlington.

We are passing two towers where the American Base is situated. It is used to fly Fl-ll's to Libya. During the war, English lads said of American soldiers that they were overpaid, oversexed, and over here. Americans replied that the English were underpaid, undersexed, and under us. English boys were jealous because the Americans could supply the girls with stockings (in short supply then.)

A short distance from the American base is the airfield where Libyan pilots are being trained. According to our guide, Prince Philip has announced that they are being grounded—but that is not so, they are only not being allowed to fly alone. (As a matter of fact, a few days later after the English intercepted a phone call from one of the Libyan pilots to his homeland offering to act as a "suicide pilot", England expelled several of the pilots and Libyan diplomats.

As we are leaving Wilshire, the hedges which line the road are trimmed by the township on road side, but farmer has to cut hedge on inside of his property. "Avon" is the Saxon name for "River." Mounds on the right of the road are burial grounds.

We are now approaching Stonehenge, the most famous prehistorical temple in Europe. It is a collection of stones set up in circles used as a place of prehistoric worship over a very long period of time. Its monolithic boulders and concentric circles still remain a source of mystery today. It may have been used for astronomy. It has also been suggested that it was a temple for sun-worship, because the entrance points down the Avenue to the sunrise on the longest day of the year, and in the opposite direction to the sunset on the shortest day.

Some people think that it was an observatory for recording the rising and setting of the sun and moon and for predicting the eclipses of the moon.

From the excavations and radiocarbon dates we know that there were three Stonehenges, one after another,

the last being divided into three stages. Stonehenge I was built in neolithic times about 2800 BC. Stonehenge II was probably built about 2100 BC, and Stonehenge III about 2000 BC.

Stonehenge I was built by the neolithic people of Salisbury Plain. They were simple farmers who grew grain (mainly wheat) and herded flocks of sheep, goats, pigs and cattle. Their tools were of flint and stone and they dressed in leather clothes like our modern suede. They lived in isolated log cabins; buried their dead in long barrows. There are 15 of these in the area around Stonehenge.

Stonehenge II is probably the work of the Beaker people, so called because they put pottery beakers or drinking vessels in their graves. They had a special interest in metals (copper and gold) which they worked for tools, weapons, and ornaments. They buried their dead under round barrows. The tribes grew in wealth and it is these rich families who built and altered Stonehenge III and buried their dead in cemeteries of barrows all around it.

There are two rings of stone—the stones in the center are of two kinds. The larger ones are sarsen, a kind of hard sandstone which can still be seen as huge boulders. The smaller ones are called bluestones, because of their color. They came from the Preseli Mountains in southwest Wales about 225 km away. One of the most remarkable things about Stonehenge is the way in which its builders were able to perform considerable feats of transport and engineering using only the simplest tools and equipment and relying on human muscles as the only source of power.

Back to our bus to continue our journey to Bath. The countryside is more rolling hillsides, the construction of the soil is very thin, and it is a poor spot to grow crops.

BATH

We are getting our first good view of Bath as we descend a large hill to the valley below. It's unbelievable—you think you are in a Roman town in Italy. The city is surrounded by seven hills and the houses, in Roman style architecture, cling to the hillsides.

The springs of Bath are very ancient, first used by groups of hunters 7000 years ago. In the centuries before the Romans came, the Celtic inhabitants revered the springs as sacred to the Goddess Sulis. The Romans arrived in 43 AD and called the place "Aquae Sulis." Coming from a mild climate, the Romans suffered badly from rheumatism. They treated their various ailments at springs and baths. When they found that the miraculous spring near the Avon was sacred to Sulis, they decided to link this local Celtic deity to a

Roman goddess associated with health and healing, and built a temple in their joint honor above the sacred spring. Images of both deities can be seen in the Roman Baths Museum near the spot where they were formerly venerated. The hot water was piped and channelled into a series of baths. Around them a splendid resort arose.

The Romans stayed for nearly four hundred years; but in 410, the emperor told the people of Britain that he was no longer able to assist them against the meandering Scots, Saxons, and Franks. The magnificent complex of baths rapidly fell into disrepair.

It was Queen Anne of England who inaugurated Bath's new age by making regular use of the spa. From the time of her first visit in 1702, society flocked to the town in ever-increasing numbers.

With the emergence of Richard "Beau" Nash, son of a glassmaker, who came to Bath in 1705 after a series of interrupted careers, the reputation of Bath improved. As Bath's Master of Ceremonies he immediately instituted a series of reforms. He became known as the King of Bath and crowned himself with a white beaver hat so everyone would know him.

In 1790 the Pump Room was being rebuilt and it was then that the first significant traces of Roman public buildings came to light with the uncovering of the Temple steps six meters below the street. The West Baths contained swimming baths, cold plunges, saunas, and Turkish baths. The city today is busy restoring the baths to top Spa status and is actively courting the tourist boom.

We are allowed a little time to do some shopping (and what a wonderful place to shop) and then back to our bus for a quick tour of the city.

One of the most impressive sights is that of the circle of the Circus—a three storied semi-circular building of Greek columns—Doric columns at the ground floor, Ionic in the second story, and Corinthian columns in the third.

The Royal Crescent is a magnificent semi-circular building lying with the Circus for spectacular effect. It is an immense curve of grey and cream stone building comprising 30 houses.

Many famous people have had their homes in Bath. 'Chicken Village' leaves fowl memory

Any historical transcript of the St. Clair Slovenian locality would have to incorporate a chapter on "Kurja Vas" (Chicken Village) on Lake Court Avenue, off E. 55th Street near Lake Erie.

The name Kurja Vas was given by the early Slovenian settlers when some of the residents raised chickens on their property during times of economic hardships.

As in all historical undertakings, it is necessary to commence at the very beginning.

In the early 1970s, the Kurja Vas area was a large farm belonging to John G. Bruggeman. His property extended from the railroad tracks at E. 55th Street north to the shoreline of the lake. In addition to agriculture, John Bruggeman also was a supplier of lake sand and gravel, both of which were found on his land. He was also the local ice dealer. In winter he would saw the ice in blocks from frozen Lake Erie and then haul them to his ice house for storage and subsequent sale in the summer.

When the Central European immigration was reaching its peak in the 1870s and housing began to boom, the southern portion of the Bruggeman farm was subdivided into city lots, averaging 40 feet wide and 120 feet deep, and by 1881 construction had been completed on 27 frame homes, mostly 1 1/2 stories, built on Lakeview Street (renamed Lake Court in 1905).

At that time the street was only 600 feet from the lake, and a public bath house was located on the shoreline in 1898.

Chicken Village was the only residential settlement on the

north side of the railroad tracks in our sector.

Slovenian pioneers slowly began to settle on Lake Court around the turn of the century, and gradually increased in numbers until by 1915, they were in the majority, displacing their German predecessors.

When industry began to dispose of their slag and discarded materials in the immediate area adjoining Kurja Vas in the twenties, the desirability of living near the lake began to wane. And when in the early 1930s, the W.P.A. began construction of the Memorial Shoreway, Lake Court was completely isolated by railroad tracks on the south and the highway on the north.

The most severe blow was to come to Kurja Vas on the fateful 20th day of October 1944. The East Ohio catastrophe struck the Clair area and Kurja Vas obliterated, a total of three homes were leveled by fiery holocaust. The remaining three homes were soon demolished, and industrial interests erected factories and houses as soon as the charred embankment had cooled.

Today Kurja Vas or Lake Court is an industrial place. Such firms as Graybar Electric, and Technical Metal Processing have found quarters on this unique avenue.

Although all vestiges have vanished, many former residents of that out-of-the-way area still cherish the memories of happier days when Kurja Vas echoed with the lively sounds of children playing with their chickens.



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

The story of the Waterloo Trade and Development Corp.

I remember the day as if it just happened. A young councilman named Mike Polensek stopped me at Cleveland City Hall and asked if I'd help get the Development Corporation going in Collinwood Village. The idea both surprised and excited me, for it was only slightly different from the work I had been involved in on a volunteer basis. I remember studying him sharply for a few seconds, felt his energy and eagerness, and told him I'd need some time to think before I gave him an answer.

The next week brought some tough moments trying to find reasons not to get involved in something so new and a little fearsome, only I couldn't find any reasons strong enough.

We began slowly in Collinwood with meetings with merchants, industry, residents, institutions and all who might have a positive impact in bringing out the truth and beauty in the Village community. A real go-getter from Community Development named Mary Ballou arrived on our scene and helped us plan some very visible improvements along the St. Clair commercial strip between E. 152nd and London Rd. Through a flower box and paint facade program with the help of block grant funding, a small grant from Cleveland Electric Illuminating, flowers donated from the city of Cleveland, the J.T.P.A. kids from Collinwood High, and our own fund raisers - the villagers could see something happening last summer.

We are still involved in all the projects this year but are im-

plementing some new ones which we feel will bring Collinwood Village and its adjacent neighbors forward in the eyes of the larger community.

The history of the Five Points area is long and colorful and holds a lot of memories for many communities today. Together with C.S.U. & Collinwood Community Service Center we have begun a Five Points Redevelopment program and have been awarded a \$5,000 grant from the Gund Foundation and another \$5,000 from the Cleveland Foundation to begin addressing the needs of Five Points. Neither the foundations nor the city of Cleveland will direct the future of this project - that must come from all of us. Your input in this vital work is most welcome. What would YOU like to see happen at Five Points?

This represents part of the picture. We have joined forces with the larger development community by serving on the board of Cleveland Neighborhood Development Corporation as its treasurer. We are active in safety issues and code enforcement with the city of Cleveland, the police department, and the Collinwood Homeowners Assoc. Private loan packaging is still another aspect of local development corporation work we are pursuing.

Waterloo Trade & Development Corporation is younger than Collinwood Village, but very strong and running fast. Paint has been ordered for the buildings along the commercial "T" formed by Waterloo and E. 156th and flowers have

been planted.

Their first fund raiser was a smashing success and festival plans in conjunction with the Slovenian Home's 60th anniversary are large and well organized.

I have discovered a spirit in Waterloo which combines the best of by-gone times in the field of music and culture, and a willingness to do the hard work of bringing the community into the next century as a good and decent place to live, work and raise families.
