POLOM KITAJSKJE OBRAMBE

Moskva, 23. nov. — Razvoj dogodkov kaže, da še ne bo miru na Daljnem vzhodu. Vesti iz Tokija se glasijo, da se snuje nova japonski podrejena država z vključitvijo dveh avtonomnih provinc v severni Kitajski in mongolskimi pokrajinami. Drugi dogodki, ki so povečali napetost med Sovjetsko unijo in Japonsko, so:

Sovjetski protest proti izjavi generala Arakija, bivšega japonskega vojnega ministra, v kateri je direktno podžigal vojno proti Rusiji. Rdeča zvezda, glasiło sovjetske armade, piše, da japonski vpliv narašča v notranji Mongoliji in da se Japonci pripravljajo na vojno z zunanjo Mongolijo in Rusijo. Glasiło svarti, da bo sovjetska oborožena sila zadala usodni udarec Japoncem. Nenadna odstranitev Dimirija V. Bogomolova, sovjetskega poslanika na Kitajskem, po zagmetnem poletu iz Nankinga v Moskvo.

Uradna sovjetska časopisna agencija Tass omenja protest, ki ga je Mihail Slavutski, ruski poslanik v Tokiju, predložil japonskemu zunanjemu ministru Hirota. Protest žigosa generala Arakija, osebo, ki ima odgovorno uradno pozicijo, ki je v svoji izjavi dejal, da bo morala Japonska direktno udariti po Sovjetski uniji, da tako uniči komunistični vpliv na Daljnem vzhodu. Araki je dejal, da je komunistični pokast, ki razteza svoje kremple po vsem svetu, telo te pošasti pa je v Rusiji. Ameriki in Angliji je pozval, naj sodelujejo z Japonsko pri reševanju svetovnega problema in udarita po Rusiji, kjer je srce komunistične pošasti.

Rdeča zvezda je napadla Japonske, ker so zasedli kitajski provinca Čahar in Sujuan. Pravi, da imeli predzniki napadalec zdaj raztegniti svojo roparsko roko na Mongolijo. "Sovjetska unija je sklenila prijateljsko pogodbo z ljudstvom Mongolije in mu bo tudi pomagala v slučaju potrebe," piše glasiło rdeče armade. "Zadala bo smrtni udarec japonskim napadalcem."

Sanghaj, 23. nov. — Ameriški poslanik Nelson T. Johnson in člani njegovega štaba so se danes vkrcali na ameriško topničariko Luzon, ki jih odpelje iz Nankinga v Hankow. Hankow je mesto izmed treh mest, kamor so se preselili člani kitajske osrednje vlade, ko se je pojavila nevarnost japonske okupacije Nankinga.

Sanghaj, 23. nov. — Japonci poročajo, da se nadaljnji kitajski obrambni sistem, ki ščiti Nanking, glavno kitajsko mesto, rušijo. Kitajske čete so se umaknile iz Wusija, glavne obrambne točke na fronti, ki se razteza od reke Jangtse do jezera Taja. Dasi je Wusih oddaljen od Nankinga 90 milj, so Japonci uverjeni, da bodo pršli v bližino glavnega kitajskega mesta v nekaj dneh, čeprav prodiranje ovirajo deževni naplavi, ki so izpremenili teritorij v močvirje.

Japonski letalci so se večeraj pojavili nad Nankingom in metali letake s pozivom na diktatorja Kailška, naj se ukloni pred japonsko oboroženo silo. Letalci so sestrelili neko kitajsko letalo, ki jim je prišlo nasproti, na poti nazaj pa so vrgli več bomb na Cinkiang, mesto ob reki Jangtse.

Bruselj, Belgija, 23. nov. — Dr. Wellington Koo, načelnik kitajske delegacije, je pozval zaostanike držav na bruseljski konferenci, naj prislokožijo na pomoč

Zdravniki najbolje plačani delavci

Težaki na farmah na najnižjem klinu

New York, 23. nov. — Zdravniki so povprečno na leto najbolje plačani med vsemi profesionalnimi in navadnimi delavci v Združenih državah. To je dognal Harold F. Clark, profesor izobraževalne ekonomije na univerzi Columbiji. Po Clarkovem dognanju so zdravniki od leta 1920 do 1936 imeli \$4850 povprečnega zasluka na leto. Za njimi prišlo odvetniki, ki so v istem času zaslužili v povprečju \$4730 v letu. Na tretjem mestu so inženirji s povprečnim letnim zaslužkom \$4.410.

Nato so zobozdravniki \$4170, arhitekti \$3820, profesorji višjih šol \$3050, žurnalisti (časniški obrtniki) \$2120, knjižničarji \$2020, obrtniki \$1430, učitelji v javnih šolah \$1350, bolničarke \$1310, navadni delavci \$795, farmarski delavci \$580 in težaki na farmah \$485.

Kitajski. Če tega nočejo storiti, naj tudi prenehajo z izražanjem plemenitih sentimentov. Dr. Koo je dejal, da ne more odobriti deloma ali v celoti njihovega poročila o japonski invaziji Kitajske in načelne izjave, s katero so nameravali zaključiti konferenco. Primerjal je japonsko invazijo kitajskega ozemlja oboroženemu roparstvu in izjavil, da načelna izjava vsebuje še ponovno potrditev nekaterih splošnih načel. "Ali so na tej konferenci reprezentirane velesile, ki so tako slovesno naglasile svojo vero v ta načela, pripravljene podpreti svoje besede z akcijo?" je vprašal Koo. "Ali ne bodo te velesile, ki razpolagajo z neizčrpnimi viri, podvzele nobene akcije, da vzdržijo načela zakona, reda, varnosti in svetovnega miru? Ali so res uverjene, da samo naglašanje vzvišenih načel zadostuje? Ali odklonitev pomoči pomeni, da se Kitajski ne sme upirati agresiji? Se vedno upam, da konferenca ne bo zaključena, dokler ne bo podvzeta skupne akcije, da ustavi japonsko agresivnost na Kitajskem."

Washington, D. C., 23. nov. — William Green, predsednik Ameriške delavske federacije, je večeraj odprto stopil v opozicijo proti prijatelju Rooseveltu, ki je izjavil v pismu, naslovljenemu kongresnici Mary T. Norton, predsednici odseka za delo v nižji zbornici, da je zakonski načrt minimalne mezde in maksimalnega delovnika, kakršne Roosevelt hoče imeti predsednik Roosevelt — nesprejemljiv za Ameriško delavsko federacijo. Green pravi, da je treba načrt korenito izpremeniti.

Na drugi strani je pa John L. Lewis obvestil kongresnike, da se docela strinja z načrtom, kakršen je in apelira na zbornico, naj ga takoj sprejme. Burbonski demokratje iz južnih držav so izjavili, da bodo podpirali stališče Greensa.

Porota oprostila uradnika detektivske agenture

Washington, D. C. — W. B. Groves, podpredsednik Railway Audit & Inspection Co., notorične stavkološke firme, je bil oproščen po federalni veleporoti. Groves je bil obtožen žaljenja senatnega odseka za civilne svobodačine, ker se ni odzval pozivu, naj nastopi pred njim in predloži rekorde o poslovanju njegove organizacije. SEDEČI STAVKARJI ZAPUSTILI AVTNO TOVARNO

Unija obsodila nepravilne stavke

DEPUTIJI USTAVILI BITKO

Pontiac, Mich., 23. nov. — Dvesto delavcev, ki so oklicali sedečo stavko v tovarni Fisher Body Co. zadnje srede, se je večeraj na poziv Homerja Martina, predsednika unije združenih avtnih delavcev, umaknilo iz tovarne. Fisher Body Co. je podružnica korporacije General Motors.

Uporni stavkarji so ostali v tovarni kljub pozivom uradnikov mednarodne unije in članov stavkovnega odbora, naj se umaknejo. Šele večeraj so se odzvali Martinovemu apelu, naj zapustijo tovarno, ko jih je posvaril, da se korporacija ne bo pogajala z unijo glede sklenitve nove pogodbe, dokler ne prekličejo stavke.

Zaradi te stavke je bilo prizadetih 14,721 drugih delavcev. Tovarna producira avtna ogrodja za avtomobile znamke Pontiac in vsled sedeče stavke je morala neka druga tovarna zapreti vrata.

Martin je priediral poldrugeto uro, naj stavkarji zapuste tovarno, predno so se uklonili. "Povedal sem jim, da unija ne bo trpela "divjih" stavk, je dejal Martin. Dalje jih je posvaril, da take stavke ogražajo obstoje unije.

New Haven, Mich., 23. nov. — Člani avtne unije in neunijelci delavci so se večeraj spopadli pred livarno New Haven Foundry Co. Bitka je trajala, dokler niso prišli na pozorišče šerifski deputiji in vzpostavili mir. Avtna unija je šla v boj, da izvojuje zaprt delavnico.

Farmarske konference o depresiji

St. Paul, Minn. — Vsi vedno večje depresije med farmarji, ki je znižala ceno koruzi za 50%, praščem za \$3 pri sto funtih, pognala krompir na 10 do 15 centov bušel in tudi znižala ceno ovsa in pšenici, se je organizacija Minnesota Farm Conference Board odločila za večjo kampanjo, katere namen je seznaniti farmarje z "minnesotskim programom". V ta namen je organizirala shode po vsej državi. Namen kampanje je tudi, da farmarji pritisejo na kongres, da sprejme "minnesotski program". Pripravlja se tudi splošna konferenca farmarjev in njih voditeljev v srednjem zapadu. Vršla se bo najbrž v St. Paulu. Governor Benson je podprl te gibanje.

Ogrska noče iti v fašistično alianco

Berlin, 23. nov. — Ogrski ministarji predsednik Koloman Daranyi in ogrski zunanji ministar Koloman Kanya, ki sta te dni na obisku v Berlinu, sta informirala nacijskega zunanjega ministra Neuratha, da Ogrska se ne bo pridružila nemško-italijansko-japonski protikomunistični alianci. Iz stratežnih razlogov je Ogrska najraje nevtralna.

Kapitalist se sklicuje na sveto pismo

Albuquerque, N. Mex., 23. nov. — Tukajšnji podjetnik Baker W. P. Stephens je obvestil državno komisijo za zavarovanje proti brezposelnosti, da ne bo plačal davka v sklad brezposelnih, ker je to "proti sv. pismu". Stephens je citiral sledeči stavek iz biblije: "Ne zbirajte si zakladov na zemlji, marveč samo v nebesih"...

145,000 delavcev od- slovljenih v oktobru

Armada brezposelnih spet raste

Washington, D. C., 23. nov. — Department za delo poroča, da je bilo v raznih industrijah odslovljenih okrog 145,000 delavcev v zadnjem mesecu. Na drugi strani je porastlo število uposlenih delavcev v premogovnikih in trgovinah, kljub temu pa prekašajo odslovljeni delavci novoposlene za okrog 80,000.

Delavska tajnica Frances Perkins dalje poroča, da je vsota izplačanih mezd v oktobru porasla za \$4,300,000. V letošnjem oktobru je bilo okrog 600,000 delavcev več uposlenih kot v lanskem oktobru in skupna vsota tedenskih mezd, izplačanih v letošnjem oktobru, je za več ko 43 milijonov dolarjev višja od lanske.

Reakcija v Franciji se zaganja v ljudstvo

Monarhisti izrabljajo konfuzijo

Paris, 23. nov. — Med tem, ko je francoska vlada zaposlena do vratu z odkrivanjem skrivnih zalog orožja in streliva, ki so ga fašistični "kapucini" nakopili po vsej Franciji, ter z lovom na fašistične zarotnike, je prišel iz Belgije manifest 63-letnega pretendenta na francoski prestol Duca de Guisaja. Prtetendent — čigar sin je bil zadnje nedelje legnan iz Švice zaradi političnih mahinacij proti Franciji — poziva francosko ljudstvo, naj ga sprejme za svojega kralja "in vse težave in vsi problemi Francije bodo takoj rešeni."

Vlada je ignorirala to monarhistično propagando, splošno mnenje pa je, da je pretendent de Guisaj izbral fašistične intrige, ako ni z njimi v zvezi. Vlada še ni naznanila nobenih važnih aretacij v zadevi tajnega oboroževanja francoskih fašistov. Poroča se, da je zapleten tudi Doriot, bivši komunistični vodja, ki je danes fanatičen fašist.

Odbor za enotnost dobiva oporo v unijah

Kenosha, Wis. — Odbor za milijon podpisov, katerega sta organizirala dva delavska lista, tukajšnji Kenosha Leader in Sheboygan Times in kateri kroži med unijami peticije za milijon podpisov kot zahteva za poravnavo konflikta med CIO in ADF, je že prejel podporo od raznih delavskih organizacij. Kampanjo tega odbora je indorsiral Silver Bow Trades and Labor Council ter njegov list Montana Labor News, I. distrikt avtne unije (Wisconsin in Illinois), Southern Tenant Farmers unija in več drugih delavskih organizacij v Wisconsinu. Peticija zahteva, naj se mirova pogajanja vrše tako dolgo, dokler ne pride do izravnave diferenc in unijske enotnosti.

Mississippi je že zamrznila čez 57 let

Davenport, Iowa, 23. nov. — Reka Mississippi je pri tem mestu zamrznila zadnje nedeljo — prvič tako zgodaj v zadnjih 57 letih. Zadnjič je Mississippi tukaj zamrznila v novembru leta 1880.

V Pennsylvaniji imajo 16 čev. debele zamete

Harrisburg, Pa., 23. nov. — V štirih okrajih zapadne Pennsylvanije je bilo večeraj najetih tisoč delavcev za kidanje snega s cest. Sneženi zameti so ponekod 16 čevljev debeli.

POLICIJSKA RE- VIJA BERE LEVI- TE 'POSTAVI'

Policijo svari pred sode- lovanjem s fašistič- nimi elementi

TARČA JE CIKASKA POLICIJA

Chicago. — (FP) — Brutalnost in pristranost čikaške policije je tako notorična, da obrača želodce celo drugim policijem. To je razvidno iz zadnje številke The American Police Review, glasila Ameriške policijske zveze, ki je udarila po taktiki čikaške policijske mašine v izredno kritičnem uvodniku.

Policijska revija bere levite policijskemu komisarju Almannu, reakcionarni Tribunin in Hearstovim listom radi njih antirdečarske kampanje in pravi: "Policijski načelniki, ki so pripravljali suspendirati 'Bill of Rights' (v ustavi zajamčene civilne svobodačine) in se pridružiti tej ali drugi sorti kršarjev v Evropi na polju politične kontroverze, bodo podvrženi obtožbam z dveh strani: 1), da mešajo svoje politično prepričanje s policijskim delom in 2), da se družijo z ono formo opozicije proti komunizmu, ki je danes poznana kot — fašizem", pravi policijska revija.

Načelniki čikaške policije in Kelly-Nasheva politična mašina so se zatekli k vihtenju rdečega strašila, da odvrnejo pozornost od policijskega masakra stavkarjev na spominski dan pri Republic Steel v South Chicagu. Policijski komisar Allan je tudi skušal pridobiti zadnje konferenco policijskih načelnikov, da bi odobrila policijski masakr in se izrekla za zvezno prekavico "prevratnih elementov".

"Mi želimo, da bi nekateri izmed bolj vplivnih policijskih voditeljev prenehali z vihtenjem komunističnega strašila v obraz ameriškim policijskim načelnikom," pravi revija o tem poskusu. "Mi nikakor ne verjamemo, da se bo javno mnenje odzvalo emocionalnim apelom za policijske pogrome proti komunistični stranki v Združenih državah. Tudi smo trdno prepričani, da ni naloga nobenega policijskega uradnika, da bi izdal take proklamacije. On mogoče misli, da se bo s tako akcijo pokazal za patriota, mi pa smo uverjeni, da mu to prinaša le njegov konec."

Policijsko glasiło pravi, da je proti fašizmu kot komunizmu, "oni javni uradniki, ki se pridružijo prvemu v boju proti drugemu, pa le uvajajo tretjo nevarnost — historijo. Mislilec Američani," zaključuje policijsko glasiło, "bodo znali skrbno definirati svojo opozicijo proti komunizmu na podlagi pravičnega postopanja in spoštovanja do ustavnih pravic, ki pod ameriško formo vlade dajejo protekcijo komunistom in fašistom."

Comments On This and That

LET US GET READY FOR THE BIG JUVENILE CAMPAIGN!

In this issue of the Prosveta you will note the official announcement for the coming juvenile campaign of our Society.

The SNPJ Juvenile department will celebrate its twenty-fifth birthday on January 1st next. This silver jubilee will be celebrated most fittingly by launching a grand juvenile membership campaign lasting throughout the jubilee year.

As you will note, this campaign will be distinguished from other campaigns of our Society by a great array of cash prizes to be given those members who obtain the highest number of applicants for our Juvenile department. Such rich prizes as the two at the top of the list have never before been offered in the history of the Slovene National Benefit Society.

It is earnestly hoped, however, that these prizes will not be the main draw in our coming campaign. There have been campaigns in the past with much smaller prizes yet they were comparatively successful. Prizes as such in our membership campaigns should always be deemed as partial recompense of actual expenses—more or less unavoidable—involved in an agitation, for instance, for the loss of time if for nothing else, or for gasoline. We hope much of this will be used in this campaign.

It is the idea that is the main driving force in all our membership campaigns. It is the burning desire of all our active members to see the SNPJ grow and progress in all directions that will give again the grandest push for attaining the new and fresh successes. This idea to work for something good so that the good will become still better and better gives to any SNPJ member who is in earnest more satisfaction than any cash compensation he or she may achieve. We know this from experience.

There is no need to tell you of the importance of our Juvenile department. It must grow, constantly grow, if the Society wants to grow and progress. The Juvenile department is nowadays our only reserve out of which new members are being recruited. Since the World War and restriction on immigration, there are no other avenues left for new members to come from except the younger generation.

Adult membership dying off or otherwise lost must be replenished by younger members transferred from the Juvenile department, and the juveniles so transferred must be replenished by new juveniles. This process has been going on for years now, and if the outgoing juveniles outrun the incoming juveniles, as happened in the last several years, our membership reserve is weakened.

So, it has become our chief duty to keep a constant gain in the Juvenile department. Our membership reservoir should always be full!

It is the duty of every SNPJ adult member who has children to have them join the SNPJ Juvenile department. There are many SNPJ members with one or several children who have neglected this duty. Perhaps they presume that the insurance companies or other fraternal societies are better. If so, they should be informed that the SNPJ has to offer in the matter of insurance and education for the juveniles. Are there any SNPJ members who do not yet know that our Society publishes a monthly magazine for all its juvenile members and delivers it to them free of charge? What insurance company or what other fraternal society does this?

There is a great mass of non-members, Slovenes, and other nationalities for that matter, who assumingly are indifferent towards the principles distinguishing our fraternal societies and also as to those children are eligible for our membership. Under our new by-laws any child can become a member of the SNPJ at birth, regardless of whether the parents are members or not. This simplifies matters and greatly reduces the effort of our campaigners. Let us get ready at once, and let us not overlook any possible chance.

The SNPJ Juvenile department has now about 15,000 members. There is not the slightest reason why this number should not rise up to 20,000 at the end of the next year's campaign. It's up to us to get busy.

Secure New Members for No. 5, N. P. J.

Important Instructions Regarding Eligibility of Lodge Officers

The following month election of local lodge officers shall take place as usually. However, the last convention adopted a new ruling in connection with local lodge officers (Sec. 102) to which we call your attention, and which reads in part:

"No person shall be qualified as an officer of a local lodge or a member of any committee thereof who is a member of the Executive Committee or representative of any life insurance company, NEITHER SECRETARY OF OTHER FRATERNAL SOCIETY SHALL BE ELIGIBLE.

The above section of the by-laws is interpreted as follows: A member of our Society who at the same time might be a member of some other organization and is serving in the capacity of secretary there cannot be a candidate for any lodge office in the SNPJ. Members as well as lodge officers are requested to take this into consideration. We also recommend that this notice be read to the membership at your meeting in December before the election of officers, so that all members will be enlightened as to who is qualified to hold office.

In reference to questions regarding those members who are insured for death benefit only, if they are eligible to hold office or not, the answer is yes. Members who are insured for death benefit only in accordance with our by-laws and statute, have the same rights within the organization as those members who are insured for disability and sick benefit in addition to the death benefit, with the exception, of course, that they are not entitled to those benefits for which they do not pay. Therefore, members insured for death benefit only may be candidates for any local lodge office and can hold office if duly elected.




Women's Round Table

EMILE ZOLA
By this time, any additional praise on that powerful movie, "The Life of Emile Zola" are probably outdated. One can only say: if it is playing in your neighborhood and you have not seen it, place it on your "must" list.

Looking back upon it, there are several artistic high points that, willing or unwilling, stay on like the writing of an indelible pencil. These are: Zola's first triumph with the publication of "Nana," his parting with Cezanne, and his courtroom speech. Artistically, too, the performance of Paul Muni cannot be overlooked.

Factually, the film is again only "based" on the life of Emile Zola. The biography of this man reads like a story of fiction itself.

His was a strange combination of nationality. His father was part Greek and part Italian. The word "zolla" in Italian means a clod or lump of earth. Zola's father was Francesco Zola, who, upon transporting himself to France, became Francois Zola. He married a French girl. Thus Emile Zola was French, Italian, and Greek.

Emile and his parents lived in the best of circumstances until the young

lad was seven years of age. Then the father died, and Emile's story becomes one of steady decline into poverty and more poverty until he tasted the depths of the bohemian life in the Latin quarter of Paris. At the age of 21, his hunger was so great that he would set traps on the roof for sparrows and broil them on the end of a curtain rod. He was living on bread dipped in olive oil—olive oil which his friends sent him. Reduced still further, he was forced to pawn his shirt and finally his last pair of trousers, and wound the bed-sheet about him as his sole covering.

But the spark or romanticism persisted. In his boyhood he had made friends with Cezanne who dreamed of becoming a great painter, and Balzac, who mapped out a poet's future for himself. And Zola was steeped in the romantic literature of the time. The three of them were always together reading aloud passages from Victor Hugo to each other—because Hugo was on the forbidden list! We see Zola in the "composition" class where the professor was lecturing—with a volume of George Sand spread before him. Afterwards he was months behind in his "rhetoric!"

It is interesting to note that not until the age of 28—after he had published a large number of works—did he formulate his policy of realism and become an apostle of Truth. At that time he said, "I am a positivist, an evolutionist, a materialist; my system is heredity. . . I wish to be a painter of life. I must therefore ask of science to explain life to me, to make it known to me."

From that time forward he no longer imagined plots wherewith to make stories. He went to the actual scenes and moved among the people about whom he wrote, and recorded what he saw and found. (He had been rescued from his abject poverty by a friend of his mother's who had found him a position as clerk.)

Zola spared nothing in his search of truth. He journeyed to Lourdes, from whence had come stories of the miracles that were performed by the Catholic Church. He went to Rome—to Paris. From this came his trilogy "Lourdes," "Paris," and "Rome." All of Zola's works are in the Index of the Catholic Church! (Our own Ethin Kristan has made a Slovene translation of the novel "Rome.")

Among his great works, mention must be made of "Germinal" called the poem of a strike. His understanding and sympathies were so unmistakable that the downtrodden masses of the world looked to him as their prophet.

These are but a few of the incidents of his life beside the Dreyfus affair—the only one which the movie emphasizes. Even as it stands, however, the film is powerful propaganda for justice and tolerance, and has succeeded in capturing the interest of American audiences without the usual recourse to a flimsy love story.
