SDZ FINANCIAL FIGURES RANK NEAR TOP; FRATERNAL WEEK MAY 2-8

National Fraternal Week — that is the title designated for the week of May 2-8. That week, fraternal organizations all over the country, will unite in celebrations which will include parades, pageants, and various other events requisite to the publicity of numerous fraternities that last year collected \$186,000,000 and had \$1,000,000,000 in assets, and insurance in force to the amount of approximately \$6,000,000,000.

Financial figures of SDZ compare favorably with the national average and, to be completely truthful, it has a larger percentage of immediate assets in relation to insurance in force. The national percentage is about 17%,

whereas the percentage of SDZ is very near 25%. This is concrete evidence that SDZ is a very sound organization, and justifies our faith and trust in its welfare and progress.

We have derived many benefits from the lodge system of SDZ, including inexpensive life insurance and various inter-lodge activities, which stimulate good will and brotherhood. Furthermore, the juvenile department has been well organized. Although this is a new venture, it is already exhibiting signs of success in the form of new members, increased interest and new friendships.

JEANETTE PERDAN-JUTTNER IN RECITAL AT PUBLIC AUDITORIUM

Jeanette Perdan-Juttner will give an international recital in the Little Theatre of the Public Auditorium on April 24, 1938.

Mrs. Juttner graduated from Baldwin-Wallace College, Berea, O., with a Bachelor of Music Degree in 1930. For many years prior to entering college she had been a pupil of Mme. Rachelle LePrevost and was very active in musical circles, both as an accompanist, as well as soloist. Prior to leaving for Europe to continue her musical studies, Mrs. Juttner gave concerts in Illinois, Pennsylvania and Ohio.

In May, 1931, Mrs. Juttner left for Ljubljana, Yugoslavia, to continue her studies in solo and opera. In 1933 she received the teacher's diploma at the Ljubljana Conservatory. She performed in leading roles at the Opera School in "Martha," "Merry Wives of Windsor" and others. During the summer months she continued her vocal studies in Vienna and Milan where she studied the "Bel Canto" system. After completing her studies at the Ljubljana Conservatory she left for Belgrade, Yugoslavia, as soloist at the Belgrade Radio Station. At the musical lectures course of the Belgrade University, Mrs. Juttner sang American, Indian and Negro songs. She also assisted the Royal Garrison Corps concerts held in the municipal park at Belgrade.
