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

ANTON SMREKAR, Treasurer

The Treasurer made a motion that the Supreme Board ratify the security transactions made by the Financial Committee during the six month period. Motion seconded by Frances Kimak. Motion carried.

President Joseph J. Konrad, now called on the first Trustee, Joseph Sinkovec for his report.

Mr. President, members of the Board and guests. The three Trustees were asked to meet to audit the Society's securities on Saturday, January 22, 1977. All of the Trustees were present and we made a thorough examination of the Society's stocks and bonds, Certificates of Deposits and other valuable papers. We found everything in good order. Our Society is going in the right direction thanks to our President, Secretary and Treasurer for the good job they performed during the year. This is my report. Thank you.

JOSEPH SINKOVEC — First Trustee

A motion was made by Robert M. Kochevar and Seconded by Anna Jerisha that the First Trustee's report be accepted as given. Carried.

President Joseph J. Konrad now welcomed our newest member of the Supreme Board, our Second Trustee, Frances Kimak, and asked for her report.

Mr. Chairman, Fellow Board Members and Guests,

As this is my first appearance at a regular Board meeting, I wish to express my pleasure in joining you here, wherein we have a mutual goal in promoting the growth and prosperity of the Society. On January 22, 1977, just one month ago, the three trustees accompanied our President, our Secretary and our Treasurer to the bank where we reviewed and verified the various

investment documents held by the Society. These investments were found to be sound and I was especially impressed with the amounts that have been invested recently. Our Officers are now purchasing Certificates of Deposits at substantial rates of interest. All records of the documents were found to be in good order. Thank you.

FRANCES KIMAK — Second Trustee

Nancy Osborne made a motion that the report of the Second Trustee be accepted. Motion seconded by Joseph Sinkovec. Carried.

President Joseph J. Konrad now called upon the Third Trustee for his report.

Mr. President and members of the Board. I want to especially welcome our newest Trustee, Fran Kimak. We all work very well together. As reported by my fellow trustees, everything at the bank was in excellent order. The leaders of the Society are to be congratulated for their outstanding work. I thank you.

ANTHONY TOMAZIN — Third Trustee

A motion was made by Joseph Drasler and seconded by Anton Smrekar that the report of the Third Trustee be accepted. Motion Carried.

President, Joseph J. Konrad now asked the Board members if there was any "OLD BUSINESS" they would like to have brought to the attention of the Board. Our Secretary, Robert M. Kochevar, then read to the Board a letter from the Society's Spiritual Director, Rev. Aloysius Madic in which Father Madic expressed his regrets at not being able to attend the meeting due to his recent illness. Father Madic sent his greetings and best wishes to all the Supreme Board Members.

The Secretary then asked the Board Members to report as to the feelings of their respective lodge members about holding a picnic. The subject had been initially raised at the Society's convention. Several of the Board members reported that the members of their respective lodges thought that the plans for a picnic were not a good idea.

Additional discussion raised the question about reinstituting the annual President's Ball, but only on a smaller scale and limiting the participants to only active lodge members. The Board then voted to reinstitute the President's Ball and a reservation was made for November 11, 1977 at Marlene's Landmark in Bridgeview, Illinois.

Because this date is on a Friday evening, the facility was available with a minimum guarantee of 150 persons. The Board then voted a \$10.00 charge per ticket. The Board asked the First Trustee, Mr. Sinkovec to make arrangements for an orchestra.

It was decided that Chateau Briand would be served as the entree at the party. As in the past, buses would be available for the transportation of the Joliet Lodge members who do not wish to drive themselves. Additional details to be worked out at our next Board Meeting in July.

#### NEW BUSINESS

The Secretary then read the letters from the various lodges in which they requested funds to help promote fraternal activities in their lodges for the year 1977. The requests were as follows:

Lodge No. 1 — \$1,600.00  
Lodge No. 6 — 412.00  
Lodge No. 12 — 700.00  
Lodge No. 13 — \$2,047.00

Robert M. Kochevar made a motion that the requests be granted. Motion was seconded by Anton J. Smrekar and carried.

The President then reported to the Board that in January, the Home Office employees of the Society were given a 6% increase in salary. He then asked the Board to consider an increase in the salary of the Business Manager and General Manager of the Society, recommending that a 5% increase be considered.

Anthony Tomazin then recommended that a 5% increase in these two salaries be approved. This motion was seconded by Joseph Sinkovec. Carried.

In behalf of the First Vice-President who was not able to attend this meeting, the First Trustee, Mr. Sinkovec made a request of the Board in behalf of the First Vice President that consideration be given in voting funds for projects. These projects were for the St. Stephen's School Science project, St. Stephen's Athletic Department for the Football Team, for the Cub Scout Pack 3285 and for the Society's annual donation to Father Lawrence Grom for his continued efforts in recruiting young men for the priestly vocation. After discussions, the Board voted \$1500.00 to be apportioned to these worthwhile projects. This motion was made by Robert M. Kochevar and seconded by Frances Kimak.
